

From Pastor Steve's Desk

November is a month for Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving should not be just one day a year. Rather it ought to be a way of life. We ought to have the good manners to stop, recognize what God and others have done for us (and daily do for us) and make an effort to say, "Thank you!" It is interesting that thanksgiving is a lost (to some) art. There is a story of the LORD Jesus healing 10 lepers (giving them their lives back) but only one took time to seek Him out and say, "Thank you, LORD." (The story is recorded in Luke 7:11-19.) But before we are too critical of those that did not return to thank the LORD, look at your own life. I know that often I have prayed for something, for myself, for a loved one, for a friend and when God grants the request, I may have already forgotten that I had asked. The one leper sought Jesus out, threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked Him. (Luke 17:16). The example is: Thanksgiving recognizes something that God has done, seeking Him out (not in a cursory way), a falling at His feet in humility, and a verbal "Thank You, LORD." The truth is that, too often, we take God's gifts and goodness for granted. Those things that God does, which are to draw us in love to Him, are quickly forgotten.

My son Seth and his family started a tradition. They bought a basket and a bunch of river stones. Whenever God did something special, when He answered prayer or provided or protected, when the family came home, they took a stone, wrote on it what God had done and the date and put in the basket. As the basket filled with 'written on' stones, it became a testament of God's faithfulness. For me, I journal my prayers, so that I have a record of what I have asked (and keep asking until God answers). Sometimes, He answers right away. Sometimes, He gives something better than I had hoped or asked for. Sometimes I have to learn to wait. But I am told to ask and then to see how God answers and then give thanks.

In the story in Luke 17, all the lepers that asked were healed of leprosy, but the one that came back to give thanks received more than the others. Jesus said to him, "Rise and go; your faith has made you well." He had already been healed of his leprosy, but his faith (displayed in thanksgiving) made him 'well.' I take to mean more than just the physical healing, but spiritual wellness, emotional wellness. In every way, he was made well. But he would not have experienced that total 'wellness' if he had not taken time to say, "Thank You, LORD."

God has demonstrated clearly to me that what I have to offer our kids and our grandchildren is "my picture of Jesus"; There is nothing better or greater that I can give them than continuous glimpses of who Jesus is to me in my every day, my every moment. There is nothing more helpful for me to offer than my lifetime experience and anchor-solid confidence that He created them FOR His own pleasure, to belong to Him, and He DOES NOT make mistakes nor does He ever loose sovereign control over all things. St. Paul's Evangelical Church Board Meeting

October 19, 2020

The St. Paul's Evangelical Church Board met on Monday, October 19, 2020 at 6:30 P.M. for the monthly meeting. Those in attendance were Donald Gerlach, Debi Baumert, Mark Oerly, Lisa Porter, and Pastor Steve Watson. Mark Rohrbach joined via telephone. Pastor Watson offered a prayer before the meeting started.

Donald Gerlach brought the meeting to order.

The September minutes were not available for review, so they will be approved at the November meeting.

The Treasurer's Report was reviewed. Mark Oerly moved to approve the Treasurer's Report and Debi seconded the motion; motion carried. The Treasurer's Report was approved.

Unfinished Business

Donald reported that the four spotlights were in and that he would contact Meyer Electric to have them installed in the front of the sanctuary.

New Business

The bills were presented for approval. Debi moved to approve the bills and Lisa seconded the motion; motion carried. The bills were approved.

Donald and Lisa will be going off the board this year. Donald reminded the board that a search for two new board members was needed.

Updating Memorial Plaque – The plaque has not been updated in several years. Lisa offered to have the names and dates engraved if someone would provide her with the names. Debi doesn't have access to previous information regarding memorials given on behalf of a member. She will go back through her books and make a list of what she has. She said Susan Borts would have records from her time on the board and she could get those as well. Lisa will look through the church history/record book for deaths recorded and maybe that will jog someone's mind whether a memorial was given.

The Every Child's Hope offering for Christmas Eve was discussed. Pastor Watson reported that he received material from Every Child's Hope, but after looking through it, he found nothing spiritual in it. Debi did some research and suggested Samaritan's Purse. Pastor Watson further explained Samaritan's Purse. After further discussion, the Board thought it might be a good option for the Christmas Eve offering.

Mark Rohrbach brought up the Christmas Program and asked whether someone was working on one. At this time, the board did not feel it was necessary to cancel the Christmas Eve Program. There was a suggestion of possibly singing hymns rather than doing a Christmas Program. This would alleviate the possibility of someone involved in the program getting sick or quarantined at the last minute. However, since the Sunday School is in charge of the Christmas Program, Debi will mention it to Kirby Baumert and Leisa Hees.

Debi reported that the total for the Fall CROP Walk so far is \$12,380. Senior Housing will receive \$4210, Community Building \$4460, and the Pool \$3710.

Pastor's Report

Grace Methodist Church will host the Thanksgiving service on Wednesday, November 25, 2020. David Griffith, retired pastor, will be preaching. New Hope and Jamestown Baptist Church are not participating.

The Atkins cleaning service is not getting the church basement clean. Donald will call Atkins and notify them that if the basement doesn't get cleaned to our satisfaction, we will be canceling their service.

Pastor Watson has been trying to touch base with people, but some still do not want in person visits. He is trying to make phone calls.

On November 11, 2020, the Middle School Youth Group will start meeting.

Pastor Watson attended an Evangelical Association meeting in Millstadt, IL. He will divide the mileage cost between St. Paul's church and Moniteau Advent church for reimbursement. He will also be participating in a seminar online (Post Covid & Digital Ministry), presented by Dallas Seminary in the first part of January 2021.
