May 9th is Mother's Day—a day we set aside to honor our moms. There is so much that could be said. Mothers carried us for nine months, nurturing us as God formed our bodies. Ps. 139 says,

"For You (O God) formed my inward parts; You knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are Your works; my soul knows it very well. My frame was not hidden from You, when I was being made in secret"

God knit us together as a craftsman makes a work of art (and we are a work of art). Recently, I met my newest grandson, Caleb Mathis Watson. I know that science tells us that a sperm from the father and an egg from the mother combined and the process of cell division and differentiation took place over the next few weeks and then the organs, bones, muscles, nerves, eyes began to mature and develop. It is an amazing thing, that the cells differentiate at the right time, in the right place, in the right way so that what is born is a complex body with a multitude of different cells with different functions.

It is a marvelous thing for the Lord to use a woman's body to form a new life and then entrust that new, eternal life to the care of a mom (along with a dad)—to feed, to teach, to protect, to prepare for life. One of the great joys and responsibilities of a parent is to help the child come to know and love the One that formed him/her.

In Proverbs 31 we are told of all the things that a mother does from caring for the house, making and caring for clothes, providing food for the family, doing business, caring for those that are less fortunate, helping her husband become respected, being wise, but the author of Prov. 31 concludes:

³⁰Charm is deceptive, and beauty is fleeting; but a woman who fears the LORD is to be praised. ³¹Honor her for all that her hands have done, and let her works bring her praise at the city gate.

The one characteristic above others which affects everything else she does is being, "a woman that fears the LORD." That is more than being religious, it is having a deep understanding of who and what God is, of loving Him and having a growing relationship with Him, of putting all of life in the proper perspective under His authority.

Luckily, the Smith family agreed to help with several of the history /creation/dinosaur related questions. This was invaluable to us leaders, and I learned as much as the youth during those discussions!

Overall, we have had a great year. It is always sad to see a good group of seniors graduate, but I know we have several freshmen coming up that will be great members!

Last, we are very excited about going on a mission trip this summer to Westfield, IN. We are working through an organization called Group Workcamps. We will stay in a school, sleep on air mattresses in the classrooms, eat in the cafeteria, and have nightly worship services in the gym. During the day, we will go out into the community and work on houses of low income and elderly people. The combination of service, powerful nightly sessions, and simply being away from home and the daily grind of life puts everyone's heart in a vulnerable position for the Holy Spirit to work. Monday, April 19, 2021

The meeting was called to order by President Debi Baumert and opened with prayer led by Pastor Steve Watson.

Those in attendance were Debi Baumert, Mark Rohrbach, Ben Marshall, Nancy Haldiman, Mark Oerly and Sandee Eschenbrenner.

The minutes of the March meeting were read and approved with the correction of the spelling of Loshe to Lohse. The motion was made by Ben Marshall and seconded by Nancy Haldiman. Motion passed.

Mark Rohrbach presented the March Treasury Report. The motion to approve was made by Mark Oerly and seconded by Nancy Haldiman. Motion passed.

OLD BUSINESS:

1. Website: Pastor Steve advised that he would check our Website to see if any updates are needed.

2. Church Record Book: New members that joined St. Paul's on Palm Sunday have been recorded. They are Tim & Amber Wilson, Nat & Karen Smith, and Doug & Jackie Cowgill. The Board also discussed the idea of hereafter including the names of the new members in the Bulletin. It was also suggested that the "Reception of New Members" should be included in the Bulletin's "Order of Worship".

3. Men's Bathroom: Ben advised that the repairs have been completed.

4. Church Photo Directory: Nancy Haldiman gave us an update on her progress in locating a photographer to handle a new Church Directory. Mark Rohrbach suggested that it might be helpful to get an idea of Package Prices available from each. After some discussion, it was decided that Nancy would continue to gather information.

5. Sanctuary Furniture Arrangement: Some months back, when the upstairs restoration was being completed, you will recall the furniture in the altar area was rearranged several times. We had thought to allow the congregation a say in the final arrangement, but delayed until more were in regular attendance. Thus, pictures have now been made of the available arrangements and will be posted for your review and final selection. You will be asked to select your favorite on Sunday, May 9th (Mother's Day).

6. Sewer Situation: As most of you are aware, another backup occurred and we again needed to contact Rainbow International Restoration for cleanup. We also hired All Clear Pump & Sewer to scope the church's sewer lines. This led to our hiring Gene Haile Excavating to install a clean out and check valve.

7. Basement Door: A new basement door has been installed. It will be painted as soon as weather allows.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. April Bills: Mark Rohrbach presented the new bills for the month. The motion to pay same was made by Nancy Haldiman and seconded by Mark Oerly. Motion passed.

2. Bulletins: Paulette Reynolds has advised the board that she would like to retire from preparing the weekly bulletins. Debi Baumert has spoken to Olivia Oerly and she has agreed to take over this position. Our many, many thanks to Paulette for her service for many years. We appreciate all the time and effort extended to accomplish this task and commend her for a "Job Well Done"!

3. Cemetery Headstone: Apparently during the evening of a recent Family Night, some of the younger ones were playing outside and the top portion of one of the tombstones in the Methodist Cemetery was dislodged and fell over. The Methodist Church is aware of the situation. The Cemetery Committee has advised that they plan on doing a "walk through" of our cemetery to determine similar problems and then will contact Capitol Monuments and do another "walk through" with them. Thereafter, arrangements will be made to repair or correct the problems found. The tombstone involved in the Methodist Cemetery will be included in that project.

4. Foster Kids to Camp Aurora: On Sunday, April 25th, our Special Offering will go to help pay for foster kids to attend Camp Aurora. As of now, Matt Oerly has advised that he does not know exactly how many will be going. The Board decided that in the event we collect more money than needed, the excess will be donated to Camp Aurora. The motion was made by Ben Marshall and seconded by Mark Oerly. Motion passed.

PASTOR'S REPORT:

Pastor Steve turned in his report showing home visits, telephone call and communion visits, along with mileage. He advised that the Middle School Youth Group and the Senior Youth Group will have their final gatherings this year on Wednesday, April 28th.

Pastor Steve has also signed up for a conference revolving around Ministering to Older People. It will take place July 5th through the 9th.

At our recent meeting with the Moniteau Board, we discussed asking Convoy of Hope to be our guest speaker for the Fall Mission Fest. Pastor Steve has not had any success in contacting them and receiving a response; therefore, he asked the Board for approval to contact Faith Maternity Care and provided each of us with a printed statement summarizing their goals. The Board agreed to his further investigation of this organization.

Debi informed us that our next Board Meeting will be on Monday, May 17th at 6:30 PM.

The motion to adjourn was made by Sandee Eschenbrenner and seconded by Nancy Haldiman. Motion passed. The meeting was closed by all reciting The Lord's Prayer.
