Symposium Facilitiators

Canon Brian Mountford, MBE, is former Vicar of the University Church, Oxford, and Fellow St Hilda's College. He is also an Honorary Canon of Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford. Interested in public theology he has helped to make the University Church a centre for interdisciplinary debate. His bestselling book, Christian Atheist (2011), explores the phenomenon of those who find Christianity compelling but struggle with the metaphysical beliefs. His main interests are in the philosophy of religion, particularly questions of faith and doctrine, but he has diversified into other areas giving seminars on leadership and ethics in corporate life for the Said Business School and the Academy for Leadership in the Netherlands. During the seventies, he was Fellow and Chaplain of Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge before becoming Vicar of Southgate in North London for seven years in the '80s.

Dr David Martin is a former Headmaster of a state school in the United Kingdom. He taught leadership courses at the University of Amsterdam and lectured at Oxford University. Dr Martin has been an International Consultant for Secondary School Modernization in Trinidad and Tobago and in Guyana. He has, also, worked for the Inter-American Development Bank, and has served as Co-Director of Developing Schools and Services for Democracy in Europe and in Oxford. In addition, he has served as a Research Fellow in Comparative Education and Development programmes at the University of Reading.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Rev. Emma Percy is Chaplain, Fellow and Welfare Dean of Trinity College, Oxford, and a member of the faculty of Theology. She also serves as Chair of Women and the Church (WATCH), which has raised the idea of referring to God as "She" as well as "He," to counter the impression that men might be more like God than women. Rev. Percey has served in chaplaincy and parish ministry for more than 25 years. Her research interests include feminist theology and the theology of mothering. Her two recent books are *Mothering as a Metaphor for Ministry* and *What Clergy Do: Especially when it Looks Like Nothing*.
