From The Pastor's Desk

The Apostle Peter admonishes every believer to "grow in grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 3:18). A teacher once reminded me that growing is the purpose of life and when we stop growing, we begin the process of dying. Although none of us can (or should) continue growing physically, we should all continue to grow in grace (recognizing our need of His power and provision and experiencing more of it continually) and knowledge of the Lord Jesus (who He is, what He is like, what He is doing). Our relationship with Him ought to continually deepen and develop. As that happens, our lives are increasingly focused on Him and His work and our lives take on an eternal significance.

The Psalmist said it this was in Ps. 92,
"The righteous flourish like the palm tree
and grow like a cedar in Lebanon.

13 They are planted in the house of the LORD;
they flourish in the courts of our God.
14 They still bear fruit in old age;
they are ever full of sap and green,
15 to declare that the LORD is upright;

He is my rock, and there is no unrighteousness in Him.

I recently took a class from Dallas Seminary—Aging and the Spiritual Life, in part because I wanted to know how to live for Jesus and enjoy Jesus increasingly as I grew older; and I wanted to know how to encourage those that God has entrusted to my care. I ran across a statement by a nineteenth century Scottish preacher, Thomas Chalmers, "A person needs three things, never out of date, for essential happiness: someone to love, something to do and something to look forward to." As Christians, we are given grace to love others (even our enemies), but in the Lord Jesus and the Father, we have someone to love eternally, deeply who has loved us with an eternal love. As Christians, we have something to do of eternal value, share the good news of the Gospel and encourage others to walk with Him. As Christians, we have something to look forward to, beyond the grave, seeing Him face to face and enjoying Him for all eternity. This kind of growth doesn't just happen-it requires a consistent time with Him in prayer and the Word. Let us, young and old, purpose to grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Family and friends came to House of Prayer Family Church May 1st to celebrate Amanda Smith and Ashley Wright commencing The Healing House and New Beginnings one-year program. In her opening remarks. Executive Director. Heather Gieck. explained the purpose of the ministry to provide a safe place to heal, develop and receive a foundation for life that is rooted and grounded in the Living Word, Jesus Christ our Lord. She noted that the commencement marks a "humble, yet beautiful, beginning, a time of going forward and stepping into the beautiful life that God has purposed" for each woman. After Heather spoke from Proverbs 3:1-10, several attending their support and encouragement, commenting on the change and growth noticed in both women. It was touching to hear Ashley's two young sons speak of their feelings for their mother. Amanda gave her acceptance remarks first, expressing her gratitude for the opportunities the program offered and for the inspiring people she has met. Amanda shared, "The program makes you feel more comfortable because, guess what? I'm not the only one with a problem." She explained that years ago when she was going on the wrong road, she became calloused and hard. Since she made the decision to use the resources offered her, she feels this enormous inner

transformation. "I'm not that hard anymore. I want to be able to experience things... just normal stuff that I didn't care about back then. I don't feel all that negativity in me anymore and it is such a relief!" Later adding, "I have accomplished way more than what I had thought I would - ever!" Amanda concluded her remarks with a heartfelt expression of love for her daughter and gratitude to have her back in her life. Ashley spoke next stating that before she came, she had ruined her life multiple times. "I was done... I had no faith, no hope, no nothing and I was sitting in a jail cell and I was like 'Send me to prison!'" She assumed it was her mother's prayers that drew her to reading the Gospels which eventually brought The Healing House to mind. She admits about her arrival, "I was definitely still shut off but still welcoming a change of life... Eventually I saw I needed a change; my children needed a change. I wasn't being a good mom or daughter or granddaughter or niece or girlfriend. I was lacking in all departments. I was self-defeated and Heather Gieck came in and started chiseling away at my hardness. And I'm grateful for that." She continued in gratitude, "God has restored everything to me graciously." Ashley concluded by encouraging the women in the program to take hold of what is offered them, that what matters is their own relationship with God and advised the new women to take direction from leadership. She added, followed by some laughter, "It's a lot easier if you be submissive. I'm just gonna' tell ya'. I'm just gratful for you, Heather, and Tricia and really every single woman in this program." Congratulations and best wishes, Amanda and Ashley!

Update on the Jesus Storybook Bible

We have given out over 60 <u>Jesus Storybook Bibles</u> in the last few months.

A few days ago, an SUV stopped in our parking lot. I stopped to see what they needed—they were changing diapers. Moniteau Evangelical Advent Church Board met on June 28, 2021 Present were Pastor Steve Watson, Andrew Rohrbach, Kathy Gerlach, Mark Baepler and Dale Taggart. Pastor Steve gave the opening prayer.

Secretary's Report:

Kathy submitted the May meeting minutes for review. After a correction on a date listed in the minutes, Mark made a motion to approve; Dale seconded. All in favor.

Treasurer's Report:

Treasurer's Report for May was presented for review. Income for the month of May was \$2,834.56; expenses were \$3,029.81; total assets \$\$94,369.09. Andrew made a motion to approve; Kathy seconded. All in favor. A detailed copy of the May report will be posted on the church bulletin board.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor Steve presented his monthly report to the board. More information was provided regarding Faith Maternity Care from Fulton, as a group to speak on Mission Fest Sunday in September.

Someone has come forward asking to be baptized.

The work on the pews has not been forgotten.

He has a granddaughter that will be baptized in early August and asked for that day off so he could attend.

Asked for prayers for his son and daughter-in-law, Joshua and LeAnn.

Prairie Home Fair was so rainy he was not able to be there any evenings, and only a short time during some of the days.

Old Business:

Building committee has reviewed the surveys the board gave them. Their recommendation to the board is that they will contact Alice Longfellow and have her come out or look at photos of them. They will ask for her opinion on what she would do; whether to remove or if they can be helped and how. Board will be notified what her recommendation is. Congregation will be updated regarding the survey results.

Nothing new on the building project was presented.

The new projector screen and music stand are here.

Roofer came and could not find any leak. When it rains next he said to let him know if any moisture is found and he would check again. Andrew will check on getting some gravel for the parking area.

New Business:

Appreciation was expressed for Tony Barry coming and frying the fish for us at our Family Fellowship on June 27. There were over 50 people that attended and it was another successful fellowship time.

Our next family fellowship was tentatively set for August 22, with Kathy hosting. Our usual meal for this one has been hot dogs and homemade ice cream.

Plans are starting for the next Evangelical Council meeting on November 7 at Moniteau. Our pastor evaluations should be completed before that meeting so we will plan to do ours at our October board meeting. Mark will prepare the proposed 2022 joint calendar for that meeting. Pastor Steve noted a few things to consider including in the evaluations that would help him, also.

Andrew provided a church directory update as of 6-21-21, from St. Paul's. Photos will be taken in September over 3 days (dates not decided yet); 2 days at St. Paul's and 1 day at Moniteau. Sign-ups for appointments will start later this summer. Andrew and Kathy will work on a committee to help with sign-ups from Moniteau and a list of groups/individuals we want included.

Kathy asked for Blazing Needles to use the church basement on August 21 and September 18. Board okayed at this time.

Mark noted some of the kids are wanting to have something at the creek again this summer. He plans to bring this up at Sunday School and discuss a date with the families to do this.
