

Our Missionaries—the Dettmans

DEAR PARTNERS FOR THE GOSPEL, "This is the best thing I've ever done!" Adam* excitedly told me. It was the last day of the student conference, and Adam was one of many new students engaged with our movement who attended the conference. Even though Adam was first introduced to other students in our movement a month before, you would have thought he was old friends with everyone based on the way he joined in during the sessions and joked around with the other students. It was so encouraging to see him so engaged so quickly, and his involvement with our movement had obviously made a huge impact on his life. During the three-day conference, the students heard talks about the Christian life and how to grow in their faith, and Erica gave a talk on Christmas. Please continue to pray for Adam and the rest of the students that they would jump back into regularly meeting and connecting with our movement after the holiday break and exams which span the month of January. In December, we enjoyed celebrating Christmas as a family and spending time with friends. January, however, was a difficult month for us as we dealt with a series of hard events and losses, from Erica getting robbed at the park to getting rear-ended in our new car to both of us (Nick and Erica) testing positive for Covid, which prevented Erica from attending a conference in Spain. The short-term trip that was planned for January was canceled, and Eva was home sick for over a week. I (Nick) was left wrestling with a lot of questions, but I was comforted by reading Psalm 22, which Jesus

quoted while he was on the cross. The Psalm starts with "My God, my God, why have you abondoned me? Why are you so far away when I groan for help?" (22:1). God reminded me that He is near to us in our suffering because His Son came to earth and experienced tremendous suffering. Jesus was "a man of sorrows, acquainted with deepest grief" (Isaiah 53:3). And his suffering is Good News for us, since by it we can be reconciled to God! While Psalm 22 starts with questions of abandonement, it ends with resolute trust in the nearness and goodness of God: "Praise the Lord, all you who fear him!... For he has not ignored or belittled the suffering of the needy. He has not turned his back on them, but has listened to their cries for help" (22:23-24). What a tremendous, glorious God we serve! In preparation for the start of the new semester, our team spent a few days away evaluating and processing last semester and casting vision and planning. It was so encouraging to reflect on all the Lord did last semester, not only in Southwinds but also in the increased partnership and work with our teams in other cities in our country. We are excited to continue to build those partnerships and explore new areas of the country in pursuit of our 10-10-10 vision to see 10 spiritual movements growing and meeting regularly in 10 houses, multiplying across 10 states. Looking ahead to next year, we're trusting God to provide another short-term team to come labor alongside us here in Southwinds, As we've seen so far this year, "the harvest is great". Would you join us in praying "to the Lord of the harvest" for laborers as the application deadline for interns for next year, March 1, approaches? Moniteau Evangelical Advent Church Board Report – January 2022

Moniteau Evangelical Advent Church Board met on January 24, 2022. Meeting was called to order by Mark Baepler. Also present were Pastor Steve Watson, Kathy Gerlach, Paul Fennewald, Kevin Coffelt and Diana Watson. Pastor Steve gave the opening prayer.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor Steve presented his monthly report to the board. He confirmed work on the confirmation course was in the works now and there would be a class at St. Paul's.

Working on making contact with the new families recently attending.

Provided updates on WWJD and community youth groups.

Secretary's Report:

The December meeting minutes were submitted for review. Kevin made a motion to approve; Paul seconded. All in favor.

Treasurer's Report:

Treasurer's Report for December was presented for review. Income for the month was \$3,546.87; expenses were \$9,849.30; total assets \$100,843.11. Diana made a motion to approve; Kathy seconded. All in favor. A detailed copy of the December report will be posted on the church bulletin board. It was noted that the pasture rent had been paid to the church. EA membership is due and the board agreed to pay the same amount as last year. We have CD's coming due soon and Paul will take care of those at the bank this week. It was noted our checking account had been set up to require two signatures on checks but the bank had not been enforcing that policy. We have changed it now to require only one signature needed. Paul noted the bank also needed new signature cards from this year's officers and he distributed the paperwork for board members to sign and note their new offices, which are: President, Mark Baepler; Vice-President, Kevin Coffelt; Secretary, Kathy Gerlach; Treasurer, Paul Fennewald: and Communion Steward. Diana Watson.

Old Business:

New church directories are in the process of being distributed.

Kathy had touched base with Jerrod Leathers regarding quotes on insurance for the church. He advised he is still waiting on some information from a couple carriers.

Mark indicated his kids will be cleaning the church through the end of the year, if the board was okay with this. All agreed.

New Business:

The postponed Christmas program will be January 30th at 9:00 a.m. Mark will be coordinating details of the service with Pastor Steve as soon as Laura has them worked out.

Everyone is asked to bring snacks for fellowship time afterwards.

Mark noted we are still searching for Sunday School curriculum and he would like each board member to assist with suggestions and bring those to the February board meeting.

Discussion on the special offerings for the year which, at this time, will be held in March, one in May (Cemetery Fund), July, September (Mission Fest) and Christmas Eve. Discussed the possibility of one of these being for church camp.

Kathy confirmed she has the church lock box key.

Our next Family Fellowship will be February 27th and hosted by the Fennewalds. They are planning a spaghetti lunch with everyone bringing a side to go along with that.

The updated phone tree was distributed, and board members were asked to communicate together and respond to texts/emails sent out.

Ryan Heimericks will continue doing our snow removal. Paul will contact him to verify if we are up-to-date with what we owe him or pay anything still due.

The board hopes to develop a policy this year for retention of records. It was noted some info could be shared with the county Historical Society, also. Paul has access to a Google account set up for the church's use and he will work with Kathy on accessing this.

Families in Need Project was brought up. Some felt changes were in order. Members were asked to come up with improvements/suggestions to discuss further at February meeting.

Steve noted he purchased rechargeable lights for the church sign along the highway.
