New year traditionally brings New Year's Resolutions

At the beginning of a new year, it is good to look back and evaluate. See what God has done in the past year and give thanks. Take a look at your life in the past year—What went well? Where did you make progress? Where did you struggle? What do you want to improve?

We always want to improve, to do better, to move ahead. New Year's Resolutions are a part of that process. The top 10 new year's resolutions for 2019 were:

- 1. Diet or eat healthier (71 percent)
- 2. Exercise more (65 percent)
- 3. Lose weight (54 percent)
- 4. Save more and spend less (32 percent)
- 5. Learn a new skill or hobby (26 percent)
- 6. Quit smoking (21 percent)
- 7. Read more (17 percent)
- 8. Find another job (16 percent)
- 9. Drink less alcohol (15 percent)
- 10. Spend more time with family and friends (13 percent)

Notable, by its absence, is anything spiritual. However, as Christians we know that we are stewards of what God has given to us—stewards of our time, our talents, our opportunities, our relationships. We want to begin the new year with a sermon series entitled, "Resolved".

### **Mission focus**

#### Updates from our missionaries—the Dettman's

In 1517, a Catholic priest named Martin Luther presented a list of 95 propositions condemning the popular practice of indulgences, in which the church taught people that they could buy forgiveness from God. Luther argued that forgiveness can only be obtained by true inner repentance and not merely by external acts. These "95 theses" kicked off a significant period in Christian history known as the Protestant Reformation, which had a tremendous impact on shaping the theology and practices of churches today. For the past 500 years, the writings of Reformation leaders have been influencing people around the world, including here in Southwinds, like Andy\*. Andy is an English literature student in Mo-town. Through his studies, he became captivated by the writings of Reformation authors such as Luther and John Calvin, especially the idea of returning to the foundational truths of Jesus. While talking with Andy about the Gospel during our Launch Week in November, he said "I know I need to make a decision to follow Jesus, I just want to make sure that I'm ready to be fully committed to that decision." It's incredible that saints who lived 500 years ago are still bearing fruit to this day!

Thank you for praying with us through our Launch Week last month! By God's grace, we were able to meet 110 students and share the Gospel with 36 of them! As a team, we were struck by the openness and interest in the Gospel we found among the students we met. Many of the students we talked to were interested in hearing and learning more about what the Bible teaches. Later in the month, we invited people to watch the Jesus Film with us. One of those who attended, Martha\*, said she couldn't sleep the night after watching the film because she was thinking about it so much. She asked for a Bible to read! Please pray along with us that we would continue to have opportunities to follow up with these students and that God would continue to show them His Truth.

December will be a busy month for us this year. In addition to wrapping things up for the semester and trying to meet with students one last time before they have exams and go on break, we'll be making plans and heading to the US for the holidays! We're excited to celebrate Christmas and New Years with family and friends this year, and look forward to seeing many of you while we're home! Please pray for all the logistics of our trip to come together and for rest and refreshment during our time in America. Hope to see you soon!

### Notes from Mary Kay

Each time I come to God's word, I find He gives me wonderful thoughts and glimpses of Himself and His work. I'm fascinated by God's working...He is always working and always showing me that His ways are higher than mine. My constant prayer through the years is that He open my eyes to see Him work! Two recent readings from Old Testament and New have spoken to me about this. Isaiah 28:23-29 struck me as a passage that speaks of God's individuality in working with each one who belongs to Him: "Listen and hear my voice; pay attention and hear what I say. When a farmer plows for planting, does he plow continually? Does he keep on breaking up and harrowing the soil? When he has leveled the surface, does he not sow caraway and scatter cumin? Does he not plant wheat in its place, barley in its plot, and spelt in its field? His God instructs him and teaches him the right way. Caraway is not threshed with a sledge, nor is a cartwheel rolled over cumin; caraway is beaten out with a rod, and cumin with a stick. Grain must be ground to make bread; so one does not go on threshing it forever. Though he drives the wheels of his threshing cart over it, his horses do not grind it. All this comes from the LORD Almighty, wonderful in counsel and magnificent in wisdom." God is at work, drawing those who would belong to Him, planting and growing faith in their lives, developing good works and habits in them which allow them to be productive with spiritual "fruit". Since He created each of us, He uniquely knows how much of every process we need in order to become the perfect "garden" or "field" able to yield the rich harvest He wants to produce in us. He deals differently with each of us, because both we and the resulting "garden" He desires is His unique creation.

The New Testament reading following this passage in Isaiah was Galatians 6:7-9: "Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows. The one who sows to please his sinful nature, from that nature will reap destruction; the one who sows to please the Spirit, from the Spirit will reap eternal life. Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." With the changing seasons around us, these portions of scripture capture my attention to focus on how God is at work in me and in those around me. This passage in Galatians serves as a warning to me, that though God is good and He IS LOVE, His business in my life is serious. My energies need to be directed toward pleasing and walking in step with the Holy Spirit. And though life itself is wearying, I don't want to grow weary in doing good. The harvest WILL be ready in the end if I stay the course and finish the race He uniquely sets before me.

#### Read: Colossians 3:12-17

We read in this chapter how as Christians we have put off the old self with its sinful deeds and have put on the new self, which is the character of Christ. In this way, we have become a "new creation" in Christ, and as a "new creation" we put on:

- **Tender Mercy** Having mercy towards others instead of getting angry at them.
- **Kindness** Being kind towards others, showing kindness.
- **Humility** Being humble, putting others first before ourselves.
- **Meekness** Being soft hearted and sensitive towards others, not giving up on them.
- **Longsuffering** Being patient with others.
- **Bearing with one another** Overlooking the annoying things others do, not nitpicking.
- Forgiving one another Quickly forgiving others who do or say hurtful things without holding a grudge or bringing up past mistakes

Christ forgave us and has mercy on us, so we should forgive others. Sometimes we may find it hard to forgive, but we won't experience the peace of God if we hold onto unforgiveness.
