Cancer—for some that means fear of death, but I can't really die. For me "to die is gain." When I received my breast cancer diagnosis, it didn't frighten me. My worries were: What is this going to cost us financially? How will it affect my international ministry? Who will fill in for me? Will I be able to keep tutoring? I have needed to remind myself that, not only "to die is gain," but "to live is Christ." I am His. This is His ministry, His schedule, His family, His bank account, His situation! My God can be trusted to supply substitutes, money, time, and everything I need. I can also trust that "my students" are His to teach, even if I can't do it.

Through my need to communicate with others about my cancer (mostly because of scheduling!), I've learned some interesting things about people. The responses I receive are a good indicator of their spiritual beliefs. From my atheist and non-Christian friends and students I receive encouraging denials in some form of "You'll be fine." From my Christian friends and family I receive encouraging personal stories and assurances of their prayers. Those closest to me encourage me to look for how God wants me to use this—after all "...we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28 ESV) I've been amazed at the love and encouragement from our Christian family—many whom we hardly know. I thank you all for your prayers, kind words and cards.

Relying on God, and trusting him completely, is comforting in hard times. I can welcome something which seems bad, knowing it is for good. I have peace that my atheist friends cannot understand. "Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we[a] have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. 2 Through him we have also obtained access by faith[b] into this grace in which we stand, and we[c] rejoice[d] in hope of the glory of God. 3 Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, 4 and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, 5 and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us." (Romans 5:1-5 ESV).

SOME THANKSGIVING THOUGHTS FOR YOU

I really like Thanksgiving, because there is not a lot of pressure to go out and buy things. You have to get food, of course. But apart from that, Thanksgiving is not about shopping. It is more about getting together with family and friends and doing what most people love to do, which is eat.

We can enjoy the food. We can enjoy our family. We can enjoy our fellowship. But the real purpose of Thanksgiving is to give thanks. It is a day to focus on giving thanks.

Of course, that is sometimes easier said than done. It is easy when things are going reasonably well, the bills are paid, we have a roof over our head and our health is good. But when times are hard, we don't want to give thanks at all. But here is what the Bible says: "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good, His love endures forever." (Psalm 106:1, NIV).

Notice this verse does not say to give thanks to the Lord when you feel good. Rather, it says, "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good."

Someone might say, "Well, what if my heart is not in it? Should I still give thanks?" Yes, you should. Many times when we offer our worship to God, it is just that: a sacrifice. Hebrews 13:15 says, "Through Jesus, therefore, let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise—the fruit of lips that openly profess His name."

The Bible not only commands us to give thanks regardless of circumstances, but it also tells us to verbally give thanks to God. It would be like a husband never telling his wife that he loves her. She needs to hear it from him. And of course, a husband needs to hear "I love you" from his wife, too.

God knows all things. He knows whether we love Him. However, He still asks for us to give Him verbal praise. Far too often, we fail to give God what is due him. As Psalm 29:2 reminds us, "Ascribe to the Lord the glory due His name; worship the Lord in the splendor of His holiness."
