From Pastor Steve's Desk

Since I can't say it better, I want to share from Pastor Joe Stowell

"Through the years I have discovered how easy it is to tire of myself. I tire of the insecurities that hound me, of the sins that defeat me, and of the words I wish I could take back. I tire of the foolish decisions I have made, of being tempted to think too well of myself, and of my tendency to fail repeatedly.

Yet I never tire of Jesus. I find Jesus more compelling, more adventuresome, and more troubling (in the best sense of the word) than anyone I have ever known. Each day I serve Him He proves to be more worthy of my adoration than before.

And I love to tell others about Him. I love to help people wake up to the fact that when life is "all about me," it backfires. But when it is all about Jesus, even our greatest accomplishments become like dung, compared to the surpassing value of knowing and experiencing Him (Phil. 3:1–11).

I love to lead people to the true Jesus—to the Jesus who is more than a meek and mild hero of history. I want them to know the Jesus who was a tough and determined revolutionary, who came to overthrow the regime of hell and set the captives free. I want them to see Jesus as He really is, intriguingly radical and truly authentic-to recognize that He had nothing but warning for religious hypocrites and scorn for Bible bureaucrats. This Jesus loved sinners. He came to heal the sick, to help the hurting, and to restore the lost. He made losers winners. Tough men dropped everything to follow Him, and women felt safe with Him. By observing His life and listening to His teaching, we too can learn how to really live, right side up in an upside-down world, and how to really die. By knowing Jesus, we can die to ourselves and live to God.

I love to invite others to care for the kind of people Jesus cared for—the marginalized, the weak, the despised, and outcasts of this world. I love helping people get their heads on straight and their hearts back in line. I love being a part of the process of allowing Jesus to dominate our thoughts and our ways, so that our broken lives can announce the reality of His kingdom and the radiance of His glory.

I love to ignite the spark of hope in the unbeliever's heart by telling them that Jesus loves them and died so they might be forgiven. I tell them that Jesus will liberate them from their sins and that Jesus alone is someone they can follow without disappointment."

<u>Notes from Mary Kay</u> —continued from last month

Moving on in my Newsletter Stories about raising teens...When I was a teen, I had some very strong opinions about dating. My mother told me I had the strangest ideas about it that she had ever heard. These opinions became stronger the older I grew...and they worked well for me, so it is what I passed on to my children. Our oldest, Seth, told me at one point: "Mom, I can't disagree...but you sure make my life harder with those ideas!" These are my thoughts: As a teen myself, I had heard many say: "you must never date anyone who is not a Christian." Not such bad advise...except how do you know if someone believes the same way as you do? Asking the question: "Are you a Christian?" just really doesn't help you understand what another actually believes and practices. So...for myself, I was very prayerful about responding to a request for a "date". I mostly took it as an opportunity to try to develop a friendship with the person. I always made a point to, during the actual time together, explain how focused I was on 1. loving Jesus Christ with all my heart, soul, and strength and 2. developing friendships that helped me and others learn how to be a great friend. For those I went out with who had an interest primarily in how I looked on the outside...and how that looked on their arm...the first usually settled any further interest they may have had in "getting to know me". My opinions about the "American dating scene" when I was single did not change much as I moved to being the mother of teenage young men and young women. Our kids' friends generally were given some sort of "age" at which they would be allowed to "date". For good or bad, I didn't think that was helpful...as every child is very different, ready for things at different stages and ages. So, we didn't give our children an age at which they would be allowed to "date." Some of our kids appreciated this...and some, not so much. What I told them was: I can't really speak too much about the American dating scene, except it seems to have no real goals or solid values to help you develop good and healthy relationships. So I redefined my own way what I believed "dating" was about. Dating is primarily about learning how to be the very best friend you can be to another of the opposite sex (and, ohhh my goodness, if our kids use this with our grandchildren...they are in trouble right there!). As you grow and develop, your skill at becoming a great friend to another needs to grow and develop as well. What "dating" is NOT really about is finding a life mate...at least not until one is at the stage of life to live on one's own and support yourself as well as another. With this

information in hand, I thought I was helping our kids make good, healthy decisions for the shortterm and the long-term. Two of our children met their future mates when they were young teenagers. Their friendships "grew up" with them. They delight us today as 4 who grew up in our home (in many ways). Three of our children built relationships with a number of different people along the way, but met who they married somewhere along the road in college. When you have 5 children over a period of 12 years, and your own life and circumstances change as they all seem to do, you find yourself raising children differently...this was true in our case. Sometimes our older children have communicated that they think I was softer on their younger siblings. I have given that a lot of thought. Our overall "job" of parenting didn't change, but who the younger ones were, as well as our life circumstances did change...and this affected our parenting. Our youngest has always been "a take in the world around her...and RULE it" sort of person. She was in a tremendous hurry to be born, but then was perfectly quiet, eyes wide, taking it all in. We sent her to kindergarten when she was barely five...because we wanted the teacher to have some advantage in directing this tiny, but powerful, personality...who would, if she could, run the classroom! As a very young teen, she hadn't changed a whole lot from this. Having been given the same direction about Mom's Dating Ideas...she became enamored of her "soul-mate" whom she saw across the high school parking lot at age 14. He returned the admiration...and Ris was determined they be allowed to go on a "date." My other children were appalled...and at this point also, all out of our home. I told Ris that she could "date" her friend if they could figure out something they could do together at 14...neither could drive...and they had very little money. They ended up spending most of any "dating" time at our house with Steve and I interacting with them...and occasionally they could walk several blocks to an ice cream store to get a cone together. They did not become good friends...they, were, in fact awful to one another. But our daughter learned some important lessons, she did not devastate her life long- term with childish impulses, and she learned to care about and be careful of relationships with people...men and women.

A simple picture of the different aspects of the **Christian Life—The Wheel**



Each part of The Wheel Illustration represents a crucially important component of a vibrant Christian life-from the rim representing obedience to Christ, to the hub of Christcenteredness, to each of the four spokes of witnessing, prayer, fellowship and the Word.

If you need a simple, effective way to visually explain the structure of a God-glorifying life to someone vou're discipling, sharing The Wheel diagram can be as simple as drawing it out on a napkin or notepad. Challenge them to think deeply about how to be an obedient follower of Christ.

The Hub: Christ the Center

Total surrender to Christ's authority and lordship is not always a decision made right at conversion, but is a necessary act of will. For the believer, the "old life" has gone and the new has come (2 Corinthians 5:17), and Christ dwells through us instead (Galatians 2:20). God creates within us the desire to do what He wants us to do in order to express His lordship in our lives.

The Rim: Obedience to Christ

Some acts of obedience to God are internal, such as attitudes, habits, motives, values and day-to-day thoughts. But even these eventually surface outwardly in our relationships with other people. Keeping His commandments in obedience is our outward indication of inward health and love for Christ-our worship (John 14:21, Romans 12:1).

The Vertical Dimension: How You Relate to God

The Word Spoke

The Word of God is His direct voice showing us not only who He is, but how to live and interact with everyone around us (2 Timothy 3:16). This means an earnest personal intake of God's Word is essential for health and growth (Joshua 1:8). As God speaks to us through the Scriptures, we can see His principles for life and ministry, learn how to obey Him and become acquainted with the Christ who is worthy of our steadfast allegiance.

The Prayer Spoke

Prayer is the natural response to God as we hear Him speak through His Word. It is sharing our heart with the One who longs for our companionship and who cares about our concerns. Prayer not only trains our hearts and minds to know the power and glory of God, but also turns His ear towards action in our lives and of those who we pray for (John 15:7, Philippians 4:6-7).

The Horizontal Dimension: How You Relate to Others

The Fellowship Spoke

God has directed Christians to build each other up through inter-dependence and loving relationships with each other (Hebrews 10:24-25). Gathering together as the Body of Christ draws God close around us as we praise Him and encourage one another (Matthew 18:20).

The Witnessing Spoke

God has given believers the joy and responsibility of telling the world about the Good News of Christ's work on earth (Matthew 4:19). In fact, sharing this spectacular news with others should be the natural overflow of a rich, vibrant life in Christ (Romans 1:16)
