From Pastor Steve's Desk

We often have questions of God, questions like: “Where are you? Why did You allow this? What kind of good can come out of this?”

God has questions of us, as well, not because He doesn't know the answers. He knows all things. The questions God asked throughout Scripture, in both the Old and New Testaments, were to get us to think, to repent, and to return.

God's first question was to Adam in Genesis 3:9: “Where are you?” All the other questions He asked of mankind were similar, as if to say: What is going on in your heart? Who are you listening to? What are you believing about Me that is not true?

Think for a few moments on the first questions God asked mankind (Adam) in the Garden. “Adam, where are you? I desire to be with you, to walk with you and to talk with you.” When we are asked, “Where are you? we typically think of location” We might respond, “I'm over here.” Or “I'm at church.” Or “I'm in the kitchen.” But when God asked Adam He was not asking about location, but where he was at spiritually, emotionally, relationally. The question is more than about geography, but what is going on internally, in a person's heart and soul. It is the same as that which happens to you when you are trying to talk to someone and they might be looking at you and nodding in appropriate places as you talk, but you know they are not ‘with you.’ It seems strange that someone might be ‘with us’ in terms of geography—and yet ‘miles away’ in their thoughts. Adam was simply behind a bush, he was purposefully hiding from God—he wanted to avoid God because of his sin. That is what sin does—it makes us uncomfortable in God's presence, it causes us to want to avoid the One who made us, who loves us, who sent His Son to die for us to deal with those things we do (sin) which cause us to try to ‘hide’ from the God who is all-knowing, all-seeing, all-powerful and wants to spend time with us.

And so, God asks that same question of you today, “Where are you?” Are there things in your life that are causing you, like Adam, to avoid God? to want to hide from God? If there are, identify them and deal with them: Is there known sin in your life? Have you so busied up your life that you don't have time for Him? Anger? Bitterness? Unforgiveness?

Join me as we pray for our community, for God to do a mighty work.

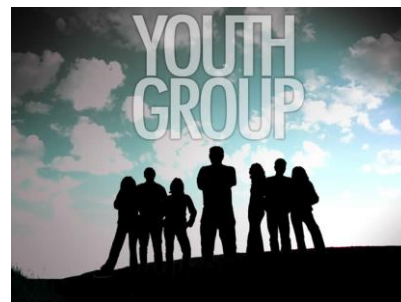

From Mary Kay

My last faith story for family/newsletter for the church was quite lengthy, so this one will be shorter with a few things Steve and I implemented for various reasons into our parenting as we were raising our children.

1) I read in a Leadership magazine early on in our marriage a tip for 'pastor's' families to help make Sunday mornings special, 'set apart' and not "even more hectic than other mornings because Dad is a pastor." My application of this idea mainly centered on making a special breakfast including a pastry of some kind that was reserved for Sunday mornings or Christmas morning. This seemed to get the whole family off to a good start Sundays. So much so that during their high school years, our kiddoes were the only ones who showed up at church following late Saturday night functions. I made a point to tell our high schoolers that they could be excused from Sunday morning church following their Senior Prom which was always all night long ending in breakfast before the kids all returned home. Our youngest son, James, played drums for worship and the worship team goaded him into coming that after-prom Sunday morning!

2) As I was growing up I had thought it only fair that since there was a Mother's Day and a Father Day, there should be Children's Day. Once our oldest children were in school, Steve and I instituted "Children's Day" as the last day of school. At school this roughly 8^A-11^A half day consisted of cleaning the classroom and sending home with the children their leftover desk supplies. We started with Children's Day being a lunch out at McDonalds or a cookout with campout at the Lakes. Through the years, Children's Day grew into some really special trips taken over a 2-3 day period. I believe we had a few times that a college student child came back to go on our "Children's Day" celebration trips. It was such a great success!

3) As our children reached their teens we began to hear tales of what other parents bought for their children . . . with the hope being (I'm sure) that we would comply. Although I am a major "rule-keeper" in personality, I have been non-compliant with cultural traits I didn't find helpful for teaching our children how to maneuver life responsibly. Therefore, there began a list of things we, as parents, would not pay for. We refused to pay for our children's dates, tats or body piercings other than single ear piercings of ear lobes on our daughters. This decision by us often simplified decision making for our children, I think. For instance, there was often a lot of 'dating' going on at very young ages, but all of this had to be

financially subsidized by parents because children had no money. In our family, if it was a 'date', Mom and Dad were not going to pay for it.

I need to add a funny story here that I believe demonstrates something very sweet about a developing, changing and flexing parent-teen relationship. Our youngest daughter is, among other things, quite an artist. Through high school and into college she loved dreaming of and designing all manner of paintings, pictures, murals and tats—mostly sleeves or half-sleeves. She would show me her designs and we would dream together . . . but I inevitably ended up saying something to the effect that tats were expensive and she could do whatever she wanted when she had the money to pay for it. This daughter also was very involved in CRU (Campus Crusade) in college and went to their big Christmas Conference in Denver several years running. One year she did much of the planning and money raising to their large group of kids from her college to go to DCC, but had no funds left to pay for food for herself for the week—so 'mama' gave her \$100 for food. I discovered, after the fact, that she spent enough of that money to buy bread and a jar of peanut butter which she ate once a day on the trip, so that she could use the money her parents gave her to have the reference of her favorite verse tattooed on her wrist. I believe the fact that she managed to get her parents to pay for her tat gave her more pleasure than the tattoo itself?
