From Pastor Steve's Desk

A story of thankfulness and unthankfulness

Two old friends met each other on the street one day. One looked forlorn, almost on the verge of tears. His friend asked, "What has the world done to you, my old friend?"

The sad fellow said, "Let me tell you: three weeks ago, my uncle died and left me forty thousand dollars."

"That's a lot of money."

"But you see, two weeks ago, a cousin I never even knew died, and left me eighty-five thousand dollars, free and clear."

"Sounds to me that you've been very blessed."

"You don't understand!" he interrupted. "Last week my great-aunt passed away. I inherited almost a quarter of a million from her."

Now the man's friend was really confused. "Then, why do you look so glum?"

"This week . . . nothing!"

That's a problem with receiving something on a regular basis. Even if it is a gift, we eventually come to expect it. The natural tendency is that if we receive a gift long enough, we come to view it almost as an entitlement. We feel hurt, even angry, if we don't receive it any longer.

It is the same way with the blessings God gives us every day. I don't deserve my comfortable home that I live in, the beautiful scenery around me, the clean water I drink. But after receiving these gifts (and a multitude of others) for years, I sometimes fail to be grateful. I've come to expect these good things. And when one of them is removed for a short time (like water or electricity or internet going down), I get upset.

Let's make an effort today to recognize the blessing we've come to take for granted. Focus on what we have rather than on what we don't have, and see if it doesn't improve our attitudes. We are to cultivate a spirit of thankfulness—which means recognizing where things come from and then specifically saying 'Thank You' to the Giver of all good gifts, our heavenly Father (James 1:17). Thankfulness requires us to talk to God about what He has done.

Updates from our missionaries—the Dettman's

DEAR PARTNERS FOR THE GOSPEL, Wow! It's amazing to think back to a year ago and what a different place we were in. We had all just arrived in Southwinds and were just getting to know the city and each other. Each day we had so much to learn about where to find what we needed to live and where to find university students and how they lived. The start of this year has not been without challenges of its own - multiple illnesses, car troubles (which made school drop-offs and pickups challenging), and the loss of our first dog Daisy to name a few. Yet we are so grateful and excited to start this year with a knowledge of the city and where to find students from which to build on, as well as a few disciples! And we are looking forward with anticipation to what the Lord will do in this city this year! As we were praying for the country and the university students this year, I (Nick) was praying through Isaiah 61. It's the passage that Jesus reads aloud in the synagogue in Nazareth, when he proclaims that He is the fulfillment of it (Luke 4:16-21). I've been dwelling on this passage a lot this month thinking about the country, because it focuses on God's promises of prosperity in all areas: spiritually, economically, physically, emotionally, and politically. While this prosperity is promised to be a blessing for the people, the ultimate goal of that blessing is for the glory of God's Name to be magnified among the nations. Back in 2011, as some in this country staged a revolution and overthrew the dictator in favor of a democracy, the rest of the Arab world followed in kind, giving rise to the Arab Spring. How much more do we pray for a spiritual revolution in this country that would sweep across the Arab world as well! Join us in praying for the future of this country, that it would be a place not where people are trying to escape for greener pastures, but that it would be built up and repaired and would bring forth praise (Isaiah 61:4, 11). Pray that the spiritual foundation of Christianity that was so strong in the first few centuries after Jesus would be rebuilt. Pray that people would be turning to the Lord, and that it would be an example to the world of God's fame and glory/ Please continue to pray for the election, and for the political and economic stability of the country.

Healing House/New Beginnings

RESIDENT PROFILE ~ this is a story of how Jesus is changing lives. Pray for those lives around you that this same Jesus will transform them.

Christina's journey before coming to The Healing House in March of this year included living in a youth home, two prison stays, a mental breakdown, a serious back injury from a terrible vehicle accident and a 5year separation from her children. As she was completing her prison term late last year, Christina had been seeking the Lord and desired a different way of life. She wanted to try to repair her relationships with her children and to become the mother they need. Settling into the structure of The Healing House and working through life issues through the Word of God, Christina has also been focusing on reaching goals. In addition to developing relationships with her 19 year-old daughter and 15 and 13 year -old sons, Christina is completing her high school equivalency exams. Due to physical limitations, Christina volunteers with the ministry to fulfill her program requirement to work. She is the primary van driver, transporting residents for work, appointments and activities. She cleans the Community Center, organizes the clothing room and performs chore and safety coordinator duties. Christina explains that she would not be able to have relationships with her children without the support she receives from The Healing House. Her children are in 3 different towns and have varying needs that include weekly family counseling sessions and ongoing visits. The structure of the house provides a good environment especially for her son who has special needs. Other women in the program mentor and provide transportation for Christina to visit her children. Christina is committed to completing the goals required by the State Children's Division for reunification with her sons. She considers successfully living at The Healing House as a proving ground for showing she will follow rules and that she really wants her family. Christina was struck by the stories shared at a conference benefiting HALO, the residential program for young women where her daughter lives. "I heard them describing mothers that were me and that got to me." When asked how she gets through those kinds of feelings of responsibility about the past, Christina responded, "The only thing that will make a difference now is my action moving forward. I believe what we have ahead is greater than the pain of the past. I can't let the past define me and I know self-pity isn't going to help or teach them. "I'm just learning how to live, how to be a mom. I have no understanding, but I know it's going to be OK. My children know me as the one who runs - they don't know the me that stays. That will take some time. When I start to get overwhelmed, I remember everything the Lord has done. Both of my sons will soon be in Columbia. I have a great relationship with my son's fostermom and I remind the Lord that I need my will, my mind and body right to do Your will." Christina has it in her heart to be able to help other mothers work through the process of reuniting with their children. With her perseverance, God's help and the ministry's continued support, we pray Christina will reach all her goals.

Notes from Mary Kay

In a Sunday School class, a question was asked: "What is the most effective way you know to make sure God's word 'is in your hearts'?" "Memorizing scripture" seemed to be the most obvious answer, but the question has stayed with me, and I've mulled it over. I think both for me personally, and in my experience with my children, the most effective tool for keeping God's word 'in our hearts and minds' is UNDERSTANDING. Memorizing w/o understanding generally has led to quick forgetting. Reading, questioning, discussing until God's point in a passage is understood keeps that passage forever in our hearts and minds. ...

My older teenagers struggled on and off with regular Bible reading, study and devotions. I noticed that every time I knew one of them was facing a crisis of some kind or another (maybe good, maybe bad), I would see them carrying their Bible to and from to have it available; I'd see it opened on or beside their bed, and I'd hear them making reference to something they've read in God's word. I believe God has trained them to "run to Him" when they have a question, a need or concern. They know He has something to say to them to counsel, advise, help. Those of you with children or grandchildren under your influence, teach by example. Be quick to "run to Him", searching God's word for counsel for every situation, interact with it until you understand what God is saying to you, then DO IT. Our children will only learn from us if they see us live it...again and again and again.

Using a resource, "The One Minute Bible for Students" we are developing a habit of daily Bible reading. The weekly devotional studies come from the reading of the week. We have added music to our time together with Greta Leiser helping. We are planning to take the group to SKY Zone in Columbia for a fun night in November.
