Friends in Christ,

"Let anyone with ears listen!" Matthew 13:9

Jesus invites his followers to listen. This invitation often comes before he tells a parable, a story of something familiar from a different point of view. Jesus' parables can tease the imagination, challenge accepted values, or illustrate something about the kingdom of heaven. Jesus' parables invite people to listen to life in new ways, to be curious and open, to be surprised, to hear what God is like, and begin to see the ways God is present on earth: the kingdom of heaven.

In worship, during the month of July, we will listen to several parables from the gospel of Matthew. Before we get to hear the parables, Jesus teaches about hospitality. Somehow, hospitality and listening go together.






May you travel in an awakened way, Gathered wisely into your inner ground; That you may not waste the invitations Which wait along the way to transform you.

Zion History

After a confirmation class of 12 in 1946, the youth group felt confident they could take on more projects. When a janitor could not be found to clean the church, they offered to do the job for \$50 for the year. When the opportunity arose, they volunteered to host the Spring Youth Rally which was held on a Sunday in summer. They served a meal, joined the Choral Union for practice and presented songs at a later service that day. When there were only a few children in Sunday School, they added to the Christmas Eve Service by presenting the Christmas Nativity. Then as members graduated and left the community, they had only members left, Pastor Mueller invited them to join the New Auburn Group.

This was also a sad time for Zion as Delores Bergs, about 19, (sister of Luverne and aunt of Scott, Mike, Missy, Ross and Ryan) and other area teens were swimming in the New Auburn Lake and she and another girl drowned. The Bergs family gave an electric organ as a memorial for her. Up to that time, we had used an old pump organ for our worship services. It was our first organ in town.

Out buildings such as the house, barn, and the schoolhouse were disposed of and a small classroom was built on one side of the basement for confirmation classes so the entire basement would not need to be heated. It was out of the window of this room that ice cream would be served when we had our Children's Day program and picnic in June at the end of our Sunday School.

The church was a member of the Ohio Synod until 1949 when Zion became a member of the American Lutheran Church.

Then in 1958, Pastor Mueller retired from the ministry after serving us for 15 years. Fortunately, Pastor E.W. Roessler, Brownton was willing to replace him. German services continued for one Sunday a month. We also were able to have Vacation Bible School under the leadership of Ann Kienitz. In 1964, Pastor Roessler received and accepted a call to Morris, MN.

Now Zion was in a predicament. Area pastors were older and were not willing to take on more work. Zion's building had not been updated except for painting and by not heating it in winter outer edges of the basement floor had cracked and pushed up the center floor several inches. There still was no indoor plumbing. There was no house available for a pastor and with a low family membership (a little over 30 families) a big remodeling project was not affordable. The trend during the last years had been for families to leave and for no new members to join. Also, we had a major problem in the interior of the building – BATS! Cleaning took place on Saturdays and altar area was covered, but overnight they left their mark. The odor remained even after removing the evidence. Every method recommended was tried. We could overcome everything else, but not that. No pastor in the area was interested in helping us out. So several council members traveled to Wilmar to see what could be done. They were told to lock the doors and join other area churches. This was not the news they wanted to hear.



Hymn History



250 years of Amazing Grace 1773-2023

The story of how "Amazing Grace" came to be is a fascinating and surprising account.

"Amazing Grace" is a Christian hymn penned by the English poet and Anglican clergyman John Newton to accompany a sermon he preached on New Year's Day, 1773. Over the last 250 years, it has become an immensely popular hymn, particularly in the United States where it is used for both religious and secular purposes. The text for the hymn is drawn from 1 Chronicles 17:16-17, in which King David responds to the prophet Nathan's words that God intends to continue David's royal line for eternity. The text reads:

Then King David went in and sat before the LORD and said, "Who am I, O LORD God, and what is my house, that you have brought me thus far? And even this was a small thing in your sight, O God; you have also spoken of your servant's house into the distant future. You regard me as someone of high rank, O LORD God!

Newton wrote the words of "Amazing Grace" from his own personal experience. He was once a man far from faith who was brought near to God by a harrowing event in his life. In 1748, while Newton served as a sea captain of a ship in the Atlantic slave trade, a violent storm off the coast of Ireland struck his vessel so severely that he called out to God for mercy. This moment marked Newton's turn toward God, what he called "the hour I first believed." Eventually leaving sailing behind, Newton then began studying Christian theology and was ordained in the Church of England in 1764. He served as a minister in Olney, England, where he began writing hymns.

"Amazing Grace" was published in Olney Hymns in 1779 but was rarely sung in England. It was in the United States where the song would become widely known during the early 1800s. While the hymn was associated with more than 20 melodies over the years, in 1835, American composer William Walker set it to the tune known as "New Britain," and the melody stuck. Today "Amazing Grace" remains one of the most recognizable songs in the English-speaking world.

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- *It is one of the most recorded hymns of all time. The Library of Congress has more than 3,000 recordings in its library. It has been translated into more than 50 languages.
- *Popular versions have been sung by Judy Collins, Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, Aretha Franklin, Rod Stewart and Willie Nelson.
- *Newton biographer Jonathan Aitken estimates that "Amazing Grace" is performed about 10 million times annually.
- *"Amazing Grace" is commonly sung at funerals, often with bagpipes, because of his final stanzas that offer the message of peace and comfort after death.
- *After Newton's ship survived the storm, it landed off the coast of Donegal, Ireland. In 2013, Ireland built a viewing platform at Lough Swilly, near Castle Bridge, County Donegal, to mark the spot where Newton began his conversion.


Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound
