Daniel Gebhart Museum Prepares For Opening Day

The Daniel Gebhart Tavern Museum will open one month early this year, on May 7th, to accommodate school requests for historic walking tours ending at the Museum. As a result, additional docents will be needed to



cover the five extra Sundays added to our normal schedule. Last year a Docent's Handbook was created, and a training session was held for new docents and for those who have volunteered previously, but wanted to learn more about the history of the Museum and its artifacts. We will repeat the training session again this year.

We urge our members to consider volunteering for this interesting and rewarding work. Just one Sunday a year would be most welcome. The Museum is open from 2:00 pm to 5:00 pm each Sunday from May 7th through September 24th, 2006. We ask that docents work in pairs so the Museum will be adequately covered. Aerial Photo of Miamisburg Restored

Stop by the Historical Society's Market Square Building to see the recently restored aerial photo of Miamisburg. This large 18 ft. x 4 ft., circa 1963 photo has been a very popular display in the North Gallery ever since our opening in 2002, but has shown its age with numerous tears and scratches on the surface. Furthermore, the backing and frame have warped due to years of storage by the city in the upstairs (now Miller-Chamberlin Auditorium) of the Market Square Building.

All of that, however, is a thing of the past thanks to the talented efforts of Quill Abney and Reese Collins who have beautifully framed and firmly attached the photo to the north wall. Barb Olekas, with the help of Nita Petticrew and Les Wead, have retouched and repaired the damaged areas thus giving this photo a new lease on life. Its "battle scars" are now touched up, and it is securely framed and covered with a Lucite panel to prevent further damage to the original surface.

Lincoln Program Enjoyed by Young and Old



Stan Wernz's portrayal of Abraham Lincoln at our February General Meeting proved to be an outstanding program. Wernz spoke as Lincoln, delving into his childhood memories and the hardships of his early years. As he matured, Lincoln was driven by his beliefs that slavery should be abolished, and thus entered into the political scene. Wernz's presentation concluded with the traumatic events and struggles of the Civil War years and finally his assassination.

The Lincoln portrayal was authentic, entertaining and sometimes humorous, revealing many anecdotes that did not

appear in our school history books, thus bringing Abraham Lincoln, the man, to life. Wernz's resemblance to Lincoln served to enhance the sense of actually being in Lincoln's presence.

The event concluded with an audience participation period in which "Lincoln" answered questions from the children in attendance, as well as the adults. Delicious refreshments topped off the evening and were enjoyed by all, even "Lincoln" himself!

Our thanks to Paul Schultz, Program Chairman, for bringing this valuable presentation to the Historical Society and to the public.





Student's Spring Historical Programs

As word of our program availability spreads throughout the elementary schools of Miamisburg, the third grade teachers are calling in their requests for local history programs to augment their curriculum requirements in this area.

Sara Berner at Bear School has asked for her annual 4-day program which includes the story of the Adena and Miami Indians, the arrival of the early pioneers and the founding of Miamisburg. Overhead slides, artifacts and

stories make this interesting for the children. One of the highlights is the arrival of a pioneer in full costume, complete with his "possible bag" and all the strange objects it holds. Pioneer, Jim Schnapp, challenges the children's imagination as he tells stories of his travels through the forests of the Northwest Territory to reach Hole's Station. Retired teacher, Betty Morris, delights the children by teaching them Indian songs complete with dancing.

A similar 4-day program will be done for Mark Twain School which is new to our programs. Teacher, Jeanette McNally, has made the arrangements for this group of 35 children. They are eagerly looking forward to joining our activities.

Kinder School is back on our schedule with a one day activity for their two third grade classes. Teacher Ginger Schwieterman looks forward to having a comprehensive program next year similar to the ones that are being done for Bear and Mark Twain Schools.

The programs last about one hour each for three days. The historic walk from Library Park to the Gebhart Tavern Museum takes about two hours and can be taken by one of several routes which include the Miami Erie Canal, downtown Miamisburg, and a short visit with Mayor Church at the Miami Indian statue at the Civic Center. Getting to meet the Mayor is a big event for the children. We are blessed to have such support.

Other volunteers who participate in these programs are Kathy Fortney, Marty Williams and Becky Lewis. The schools provide teachers and chaperones to guarantee the safety of the children.

The greatest joy of these programs are the wonderful letters written by the children to thank us for sharing our stories with them. We would love to have more people participating in these programs. 

Notes From the Curator

The following Council Meeting Minutes are taken from ledgers dating from 1838 through 1864, which were donated to the Historical Society by Mrs. Phyllis Holzman Jackson. This is the second in a series of which we will be sharing excerpts from these ledgers. The meeting concerns the robbery of a peddler.

Minutes from the Town Chamber Meeting — January 7, 1850

The Council were called together by order of the Mayor Adam Clay.

Present: Adam Clay, Mayor, and the Council Members, Mepf, Goudy, Fish, Rerchard, Conover and Gletzel. The Council being organized.

The Mayor said that the reason of calling the Council together was that information had rached him that on the previous night that the pedlar wagon of Darro Neible had been robbed of considerable jewerly. And in accordance with the duties of his office he had called this meeting and hoped the council would take such steps in the matter as would he best calculated to defend the lives and property of citizens and strangers suggesting the property of approxating a resonable sum of money for the purpose of offering a reward for the thief or thieves.


On motion the Citizens present were allowed to make remarks. After some discussion a motion was made that Fifty Dollars be approbated to be offered as a reware which was unamioulsy agreed.

On motion the Marshall was authorized to have fifty advertisements printed for distribution.


