Deep appreciation to the docents who volunteered in June and July, and I might add that some of them did a Sunday in both months:



Dale Huffman, a Good Friend To All

By now everyone has read or heard about Dayton Daily News columnist Dale Huffman's passing on July 25, but we'd be remiss if we failed to note his death in our newsletter. Dale's career as a writer, spanned 45 years. His columns were known for their humor, human interest and good news stories about ordinary folks in the Miami Valley. He was a true humanitarian who never met a stranger or made an enemy.

Because of a broken home, Dale spent most of his growing up years (third to twelfth grade) in a Springfield orphanage. As an adult, he was known to attribute his sincere empathy for others to the "hellish" years he spent at the orphanage. He had a very tough beginning, but managed to turn his life into a very productive and worthy one. Dale eventually reunited with his mother and lovingly cared for her for many years at her home in Miamisburg.







Media Production Group Produces More Great Programs

Carol O'Connell recently hosted Billy Ring on a program about the Miamisburg Train Derailment. Billy Ring, a life long resident of Miamisburg, was a Captain in the Fire Department when the southbound CSX transportation train, on the west side of the Great Miami River, derailed on the trestle over Bear Creek on July 8, 1986 - 29 years ago. As a result, three tank cars containing hazardous material caught fire. This is a two part documentary of what happened from the first alert, to clean up and the challenging events in between, which led to a successful, well-orchestrated ending of the catastrophe. A rail disaster of this magnitude had never happened in Miamisburg or in the nation. This documentary will probably air in October.

John Warrington completed the second of a three part series on the Mound Lab history. His guest was Doug Gabriel, former Mound employee, whose topic was the Miamisburg connection to powering spacecraft and lunar landings from 1960-90.

Bronze Plaques Were a Long Time Coming

Some time ago, Carol O'Connell inquired about the nine buildings which were listed (in 1975) in the National Register of Historic Places, as approved by the Dept. of the Interior (Designated Miamisburg Historic District). She was asking as to why there were never plaques erected on each building. Bobbye

Sweny let her know that the Society did not have the funds to purchase them at that time.

So, with Bobbye's help and encouragement, Carol began exploring companies where such bronze plaques were

cast. After considering costs and quality of work, Dayton Stencil Works of Dayton won the job, and the Historical Society Board approved the expenditure. Although there are nine buildings on the list of historic places, only eight plaques were needed, as one of the buildings was razed some years ago. That building was the Groby Bank Building (later First National Bank) on Main Street, across from the American Legion.

Fast forward to June 23 of this year. Larry Retherford of the City headed the crew who installed seven of the eight plaques, which included our own Market Square Building. The remaining plaque will be installed by the owner of the Stocker Building. On hand for the plaque installation on the IOOF Building were IOOF members and Ron Holp of Ron's Pizza, who occupies the IOOF Building. (Side note: IOOF stands for the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. This organization merged with the Germantown Chapter and no longer uses this building for meetings.)

Kudos to Carol O'Connell who began this project which definitely needed to be done, and saw it through to the end. Just another of our volunteers who gets things done!

Gwinner Block, NE Corner Main and Central Avenue

Market Square Building, 4 N. Main Street

IOOF Block, 1 South Main Street

Liesenhoff Block, 16 - 18 South Main Street

Weaver Building, 79 South Main St., NW Corner Main and Linden Avenue

McGuire House, 115 South Main Street

The Baum Opera House, 15 S. First St., This plaque was put at the side entrance off the parking lot. Stocker Building, 48 S. Main Street

Summer of '29

An excerpt from the memoirs of Warner N. Forbes (1914-1995)

"Without doubt the most embarrassing thing that happened to me up to this point occurred when I was about 15. I was just learning to drive. One Sunday we had a picnic in our front yard (805 E. Linden Avenue) and it was full of our relatives and friends. Wanting to show off my new found ability, I asked dad for permission to move the car from the street to the garage.

We had no sidewalks or gutters in front of our house. I started up and hit the fire plug dead center. The blow broke off the pipe below the level of the ground and the water shot eight or ten feet into the air. The car was an Essex and had strap bumpers which were bent back to the radiator. If I could have found a hole, I would have gladly crawled into it."
