

The Quilting Art Form

The art of quilting can be an individual as well as a group endeavor. Until the 1750's very little quilting had been done. Even during colonial times quilting was not a popular activity as the women had so many chores during the day and at night the light from a fireplace was not good.

As years went by, fabrics became more available. Historically, quilting and sewing skills were practiced by women and passed down to their daughters. Quilts were not only used as bed coverings, but as wall hangings which not only kept out the cold, but were also a creative form of expressive décor. These were probably more elaborate than those for every day use.

During the Civil War, quilts were made in memory of male friends and family members lost in the war. These often included scraps of the person's clothing. Even today people create quilts for the purpose of honoring someone or as expressions of opinions of various causes.



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March Program Featured Dr. Larry Schwiekart By Ted Fink, V.P. and Program Chair

The general membership meeting was held, Thursday, March 26 at 7:00 pm at the Market Square Building. There were about 40 members and guests present who heard Dr. Larry Schwiekart discuss his most recent book, "48 Liberal Lies About American History". Before his presentation Debby Cook, a member of the Material Girls Quilting Group, discussed the upcoming Quilt Show to be held at the Baum Opera House on April 24 and 25. The event is co-sponsored by the Society and the Baum Opera House Committee. Debby displayed a beautiful handmade quilt which will be raffled off on the 25th.

Continuing with the quilting theme, students from Neff School taught by Cathy Sweny displayed quilt patterns which they created as part of their spring art project. This is a tradition for the Society. Every year in the spring we invite Cathy's students to present their most recent project; this year in conjunction with our Quilt Show they designed their own quilt pattern. Everyone agreed the works were outstanding.




Dr. Schwiekart and Ted Fink

Our featured speaker, Dr. Larry Schwiekart, is a history professor at the University of Dayton and a frequent contributor on the Fox News Network program, "Fox and Friends", which airs every weekday morning from 6:00 to 9:00 am. He discussed his most recent book, "48 Liberal Lies About American History." Dr. Schwiekart's premise was that there was a shift in academia from a more traditional to liberal approach to history following the McCarthy era.

To prove his theory he and his colleagues reviewed 20 different history text books currently in use and identified 48 separate instances where the authors presented the material with a liberal bias. He admitted that not all 48 "lies" were in every book, but of the 20 books he reviewed several of them were in each book. For example in a number of books he reviewed, the authors referred to Lee Harvey Oswald, the assassin of President Kennedy, as either a Marine or former Marine, and nowhere did any of the authors refer him as a Communist. Dr. Schwiekart spoke for about 40 minutes and most everyone agreed he was one of our best and most entertaining speakers in some time. Following his presentation Dr. Schwiekart answered several questions and signed copies of his book which he had available for sale.

Children's Educational Programs Scheduled

The month of May will be a busy one for the docents presenting the Children's Educational Programs. Four schools have scheduled three or four day programs to end their school year. Bear School, Kinder School, Medlar View and Bishop Leibold will be introducing their third graders to historical stories of Miamisburg.

Each school has chosen the popular Heritage Walk beginning in Library Park and ending at the Gebhart Tavern Museum. Although the Kercher Cabin is not yet ready for class activity, the children will see the building with all the old asphalt shingles removed and the original clapboard siding showing the age of the building. Weather and time permitting, we can do some programs with the children sitting on the widely expanded grass area of the complex.

Two new programs will be offered this year. Tom Silberman will be telling the children what it is like to be a Pilot on a Miami Erie Canal boat. Such programs presented in costume hold the students' attention and are great favorites. Tom has an extensive background in theater and will bring a great dimension to this program. Besides that, he's an outstanding window washer when we clean the Tavern.

Melanie Wild is working on a program as a teacher in a one room school - complete with old McGuffy readers, Eclectic Arithmetic and Spelling books and slates. She will introduce the students to learning by "rote", and having no papers to take home! Melanie was a third grade teacher before moving to Ohio and is well suited to this program.

Betty Morris and Judy Wuerstl will continue their two diverse programs on the Adena and Miami Indians as "Early Dawn" and "Singing River" and Jim Schnapp will reprise his very popular Frontiersman with an added hat this year. I would venture to guess that the Skunk hat will always be the favorite.

Hopefully, Rolla Broerman will be in better health and will be able to join us with her special stories on the Heritage Walk. We miss her and her ideas and input to the programs. A new docent will be joining us this year. Lynley Culpepper has volunteered to join our group, and is diligently studying the book "Miamisburg, The Story of Our Town" - it's a wonderful introduction to the history of Miamisburg. Diane McGlothlin will again join our Heritage Walks when her work schedule permits.

The three classes of Mark Twain School, with teachers Amy King, Jeannette McNally, and Shannon Bobbitt, had their program last fall to begin their school year. We have received from them three wonderful scrapbooks the children made reflecting on the areas of the program they most enjoyed. Mayor Church was delighted to be among their favorites. Having this kind of appreciation shown by the students and teachers makes our efforts most worthwhile and renews our energies. Consider joining us - we welcome new members. "LEST WE FORGET"

In the Miamisburg Library Park there stands a granite monument engraved with the names of the forty-four men who gave their lives during World War II. The inscription reads:

Lest We Forget
Members of the Armed Forces
of the United States
who made the supreme sacrifice
1941-1945

Each Memorial Day those names are read at several services, however, looking at our Veterans Data Base, sixty four years later, they have been forgotten!

Larry Suttman started a project to create a book with 44 chapters representing each name telling the story of each man. He is looking for family and friends who can provide any information, photos and memories of them. We need your help! Information on six names appearing on that monument cannot be found.



Sidney Hagan Addresses Society Members

On Thursday, February 26, Historical Society Member, Sidney Hagan, provided the program for our first meeting of the year, which also included the traditional cherry desserts. Born in Hannibal Missouri, Mr. Hagan enlisted in the Navy in June, 1942 following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. He received his basic training at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station and was trained in radio communications at Miami University, Oxford Ohio. After training in radio communication he was sent to Cheltenham, Maryland where he learned German radio transmission procedures. After several trips up and down the East Coast of the U.S. he was finally assigned to the USS Greer. According to Mr. Hagan, once the U.S. broke the German Code through the efforts of personnel at NCR, together with the use of high frequency directional finders he and other members of his team were able to better pinpoint the position of German submarine activity. This in turn facilitated safe passage of troop and cargo convoy shipments across the Atlantic.

In addition to his thoughts and observations on reasons for the success of the United States in the Battle of the Atlantic, Mr. Hagan related details of life aboard a 1918 vintage four stack destroyer in the North Atlantic.
