Jacob Kercher Log Cabin Identified



As a result of some very fine research work by our able Vice President, Les Wead, we have positively identified a home located at 14 West Ferry Street as one of the oldest, if not **the** oldest house in Miamisburg!

Montgomery County Archives Records show that the land on which this house stands was originally purchased as a part of the Symmes property by Dr. John Hole. It was subsequently sold to Jacob Kercher who built a log structure on the site in 1810 (8 years before our city was platted as a village along the banks of the Great Miami River).

Jacob Kercher was one of the original four founding fathers of the city; the other three being Emanuel Gebhart, Dr. John Treon and his uncle, Peter Treon. Records show that Elizabeth Kercher was born in this house in 1810 and was reportedly the first child born in Miamisburg.

The basic structure is a two story building about 20 by 21 feet with a later addition of about the same size. Until recently, the home was covered with white aluminum siding, but that has been removed exposing an earlier siding consisting of a tar-paper material looking somewhat like brick. Beneath this material is what appears to be the original wood lap siding which entirely covers the supporting log structure. Unfortunately, this historic home is included in the area which the city is razing in preparation for development of the new "Riverfront Park".

From Our Vets Committee

From time to time we get questions such as "How do you properly retire an American Flag?" The United States Flag Code, Title 4, section 8k states, "The Flag, when in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem of display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning." Flags that are soiled may be laundered or dry cleaned. The National Flag Foundation also recommends mending tattered flags if possible.

Should you decide to retire a flag, you may take it to the American Legion Post 165 at 35 North Main Street. For public convenience, inside the North door, off the parking lot you will find a (retired) mail box painted red, white and blue for flag drop offs. At least annually the Legion performs a Flag Retirement Ceremony. It only takes a minute to stop by and drop off your flag.

Notes From The Curator

2006 is a special year for my wife and her friends who graduated from Miamisburg High School in 1956. They recently celebrated the 50th anniversary of their graduation from Miamisburg High School. Where did the time go?

The class members had two days of celebrating by having special outings, followed by being one of the honored classes at the Miamisburg Alumni Dinner/Dance and Meeting. Many good stories about the good old times were shared.

I took a look at my wife's 1956 MHS yearbook to see what was going on in that year. Her Mirus was full of personal notes from her good friends. The most popular notes were "Lots of luck", "Best wishes for success and happiness", "To a nice girl", "To a sweet lady" (need to check this out) and the old standard, "Let's keep in touch". For a good number of those attending, it was the first time they had been in touch for 50 years.

Looking further at the old yearbook, I found photos of many teachers I had at Miamisburg High School. These pictures brought good and bad memories. Some of the teachers were tough and only in later years did I really appreciate the efforts they made to help me in life. Some of the special teachers I remembered were Lester Heistand, Ruth Connor, Helen Reed, Frederick Roehm, May Schmidt and Mr. Mitler.

According to the Mirus, I noted that the Class Officers for 1956 were Paul Simmons, Dave Brueckner, Harriette Bliss, Jim Weisgarber and Arlene Overholser. Paul Simmons attended the reunion, coming all the way from Oregon where he now resides. Arlene Overholser came from North Carolina.

The Class Play was "Drum of Death". According to those involved, it was an exciting mystery. Dr. H. Grady Shoffner addressed the class at Baccalaureate. The top members of the class were Sharon Donahue, Judy Urich and Miriam Shoffner.

In the back of the 1956 Mirus are advertisements of Miamisburg businesses. Just like the moving on of the class members, the business community of Miamisburg has also changed over the years. Following are some of the familiar names of businesses who advertised in the 1956 Mirus. Time marches on as Ted's Dairy Bar, Dutcher's Sonoco, The Mary Ann Shop, Andy Schmidt's Market, First National Bank, Silberman's Drug Store and Brough's Furniture Store were just a few of the businesses listed that are no longer part of the Miamisburg downtown.

I also must mention that a number of friends from the Class of 1956, Kaye Costello Lenz, Judy Urich Rettich, Rose Philabaum Schroeder, Joyce Mears, Miriam Shoffner Shapiro and Marsha Midlam Steffen still meet on a regular basis as good friends. The friendship starting some 50 plus years ago is still going strong.

Pop Quiz Answer

The correct answer is A. In 1869 an excavation attempt included a vertical shaft and two connecting horizontal tunnels. One skeleton was discovered along with other artifacts. The height of the Mound, at originally over 70 feet, was reduced approximately 5 feet by the excavation.

If you were downtown for the "Tour d'Burg" and took a stroll up First Street to Central Avenue, there was a good chance you had an opportunity to see the 1908 Hatfield Buggyabout automobile that was built right here in Miamisburg. There are only two of these rare cars known to exist today.

The current owners of the car are Ray and Lori Baronas, who live in Deerfield Massachusetts. They made a special trip all the way to Miamisburg to display their car. We owe them special thanks for coming.

Whereas the Historical Society strongly supports the development of the land as a new public park, we are very concerned as to what is to become of this historic structure. For the present, the City has agreed to refrain from demolishing this home, which will give the Historical Society time to document the condition of the logs and to develop possible reuses for this log structure. In any case, the building will have to be moved to another site since it sits squarely in the path of the new access road to the park.

By the time you read this, a group of volunteers will have stripped the plaster and lath from the inside of the cabin, which will give us a better feel for possible restoration of the structure. In the meantime, Dr. Carl Becker is working on documentation which should result in this structure being listed on the National Register of Historic Places. This designation (if approved) will not protect the structure against demolition, but will be helpful in securing possible grants for moving and restoration work.

FIFTY-FOUR YEARS AGO September 11, 1952

A group of nine boys and girls, between the ages of 6 and 12 will do their part to aid in raising funds to help polio victims of Miamisburg this Saturday afternoon.

The group thought up the idea themselves and the idea is a homemade circus with all the trimmings. Young and old alike are invited to attend, beginning at 3:00 pm. The place is a shed at the rear of the Fred Loy property on the Dayton-Springboro Pike, just north of the stoplight on the Miamisburg-Centerville Pike. The Loy home is the first house on the left on Rt. 741, just past the intersection with Rt. 725.

Jim Wilcher, age 11, will be the master of ceremonies and promises to keep patrons in stitches with his natural humor. There will be a trapeze, which has been tested and found safe. Costumes will be used and some will be dressed as clowns while others will perform tap dancing routines. Soft drinks and popcorn will be sold and pony rides provided.


