Final High School Football Game To Be Played at Harmon Field On October 23

If you or your children attended school in Miamisburg, you surely have many memories of Harmon Field. It has been the venue for sports and band activities in Miamisburg since 1923, when the field was built. How many can remember the first permanent, wooden grandstands, pictured below, which were located on the south side of the field? In the 1950's much larger, modern grandstands were built on the north side of the field and the



old stands served the visiting team's fans for a very short period, before they were finally razed and replaced with new construction.

Did you realize that there are many Harmon Fields, other than our own? Two nearby are in West Carrollton and Greenville. In 1928 there were 117 sports fields in 34 states which were named after the philanthropist, William E. Harmon, who donated the land for these fields to the communities.

Mr. Harmon, a real estate developer who was born in Lebanon, Ohio, established a trust to provide smaller towns with the means of having their own sports fields, to benefit the children in those areas. To comply with the requirements of accepting the grant of land, the communities had to agree to the following:

- That the property be used in perpetuity for playground and recreational purposes.
- That no building be erected upon the property, except for the furtherance of desirable play and recreation.
- That the premises shall always be known as Harmon Field.
- That the land shall be open to all persons.
- That the premises shall always be kept in such condition as to be attractive as a place of recreation and shall not be permitted to become a nuisance in appearance or unattractive as a place for recreation.

Even though times have changed greatly since 1923 and a brand new sports complex has been built at the High School on Belvo Road, our Harmon Field will continue to serve the community in many ways. It will be used as a practice field, a venue for Jr. High and Pee Wee football games and a host of other uses.

Word is that on October 23 when the last football game is played, folks who have been involved in sports at the field, have been a cheerleader, or have played in the band are invited to attend this game. A special program is being planned for that night. So if you'd like to be part of saying so-long to Harmon Field as the Miamisburg High School Stadium, be there that evening.

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
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Antique Display Cases Donated By Paff Jewelers

generations, and it won't be the same without Paff Jewelers.



the Society is able to acquire a much larger museum space. At that time, they will be greatly needed and a perfect means of displaying our ever increasing number of historical items.



information in a future newsletter. It's folks like these who add so much to the Miamisburg Historical Society, by their






Gene, Jr. and Gene Paff

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2015 Veteran's Day Observance - Wed., November 11, 11:00 am By Randy Staley, Veteran's Committee Chair

Please mark your calendar and plan to attend the service at **Library Park** by American Legion Post 165. This was the month, day, and time in 1918 when an armistice between Germany and the allied nations came in effect ending WWI. On November 19, 1919 Armistice Day was commemorated for the first time by a proclamation of President

Wilson. Over the years Congress added to the meaning of the day to include other wars; changed the name, the date, and made it a uniform holiday, which created some confusion about the event. In 1975 President Gerald Ford signed Public Law 94-97 which stated Veteran's Day would again be observed on November 11 from 1978 onward. Our American Legion has always commemorated Veteran's Day on Nov.11 at 11:00 am since its founding.

Immediately following the Memorial Service a rededication ceremony of the existing Vietnam Memorial, located on the north side of the park, will be held. The names of Tom Austin and Reggie Vance will be added to the honor roll of 10 others area residents killed in action during the Vietnam War.

It's The BOO Season!

Each year, around this time, tales of ghostly spirits abound. There are many such stories being told right here in Miamisburg. Are you a skeptic... or a believer?



REAL LIVE CHOST.

A Graveyard Apparition that is Scaring a Western Town.

A thousand people surround the graveyard in Miamisburg, a town near Davton, O., every night to witness the antics of what appears to be a genuine ghost. There is no doubt about the existence of the apparition, as Mayor Marshall, the revenue collector and prominent citizens testify to having seen it. Last night several hundred people, armed with clubs and guns, assaulted the spectre, which appeared to be a woman in white. Clubs, bullets and shot tore the air in which the mystic figure floated without disconcerning it in the least.

Library Park

A haunting in our park was recorded in the Frederick, Maryland, *Daily News* of March 27, 1884. At left is a portion of the article. The headline read: "REAL LIVE GHOST - A Graveyard Apparition that is Scaring a Western Town."

An apparition of a female murder victim appeared there on many consecutive nights. In the 1880's the plot of land, we now call Library Park, was the town cemetery. The caskets/remains were later moved to Hill Grove Cemetery in the late 1880's. The ghostly specter has been seen in the Park as recently as the 1980's and may still appear today.

The Railroad Bridge (crossing the Miami River near Rice Field, south of town)

A conductor on the Norfolk Southern reports there have been sightings by train crews around that area for years. One night he saw the form of a person walking on the tracks on the eastern side of the bridge. The train was approaching on the west side and the object disappeared

as they sounded the horn and drew near. It was a foggy night and very eerie, especially after having heard similar stories from other train crews. As recently as 2009, sightings of an apparition have been reported along the bike path, which passes under the railroad bridge.

You may read many more "haunting" tales, including those about our own Hill Grove Cemetery, in a book that's available in our gift shop entitled, "Haunted Miami Valley".

Society Participates in Artisan Festival

Many New Acquisitions at Market Square

In addition to the Paff donation of display cases and other articles, the Society has also been the recent recipient of other important and interesting artifacts from several, different local citizens.



Janet Leis Reed has loaned the Society a beautiful women's desk, made by the Mutual Furniture Manufacturing Company here in Miamisburg. It is now on display at the Market Square Building. Janet's two sisters, Velma Leis Gephart and Alma Leis King and husband Lee, a long time insurance agent in Miamisburg, worked at the company during the 1930s and 40s. In fact, according to Janet, Lee was a lathe operator and may have actually turned the spindle legs for the desk.

Martha "Millie" Haney of Miami Township, gifted the entire collection from her husband, Edward Haney's die cutting career in the mid-1900s. The collection includes hundreds of advertising emblems and a golf divot tool he crafted for the first Official World Golf Ranking in 1986 at St. Andrew's Course in Scotland. It also includes most of his tools and his engraving machine, plus one of his many wood carvings titled, "The Torn Hat", which is on display at Market Square.

Gary Jestice, past Hamburger Wagon owner, gifted a large, cigar store, wooden Indian statue. Gary purchased it from an individual who related that it was carved by an Italian carver-artist from a single log and was used by a tobacco co-op in Essex County, New Jersey, along the Hudson River. It is a grand, giant statue, 9-feet tall, at least 3 feet wide and weighing in at around 600 pounds. Now at Market Square, it is a fantastic centerpiece to highlight Miamisburg's huge tobacco industry during the early years.



The newest addition to our transportation vehicles is a 1910 Enterprise "Courting" Buggy made here in the Burg, thanks to the efforts of Randy Staley and Wayne Burgett. Randy travelled to an Indiana estate sale along with John Mahan to bid on it, and won. John Mahan stored it in his barn until recently when Randy and Wayne moved it to our recently acquired storage facility at the Mound Development Center.
