Historic Home of Jacob Kercher to be Saved!

Who would have guessed that underneath the faded white aluminum siding covering the small, 2 story house at 14 South Ferry Street rested the log home of Jacob Kercher – one of the four "Founding Fathers" of what was to become the village (and city) of Miamisburg? Our Vice President, Les Wead, did – and he backed up his "guess" with some fine research which documented the fact that this was indeed the original Kercher home and what may well be the first house built in this community.

Records clearly indicate that Mr. Jacob Kercher and his wife, Anna Margaret (Gebhart), came to Ohio and the Miami Valley in 1808 and built a home adjacent to the Miami River in 1809-1810. In that home was born a daughter (Elizabeth) in 1810, who is recorded to be the first child born in the community. Ultimately, the Kerchers had 10 children (2 sons and 8 daughters) and moved on to larger quarters as the size of the family increased.

Mr. Kercher was an energetic and savvy business man who acquired a large tract of land in the vicinity of his home and went on to be a major force in laying out the original village. He is credited with donating the land for the "public square" on which now stands the Market Square Building, as well as the land on which was to be built St. Jacob Lutheran Church (was the name St. Jacob more than just a coincidence?). He also donated the land for the first cemetery (adjacent to the church) and was honored with having a school (Kercher School) and Kercher Street named after him. This same Jacob Kercher went on to build one of Miamisburg's grandest homes known locally as the "Weber House" which served as the City Hall from the 1940s to the 1970s when it was demolished to be replaced by a city parking lot.



Enough about history! The **BIG NEWS** is that an energetic task force composed of representatives of the Historical Society as well as City of Miamisburg employees has been meeting regularly over the past few months in an effort to save this historic "log cabin" built by Jacob Kercher nearly 200 years ago. Efforts have been complicated by the fact that the structure is located in the region that is to become Miamisburg's new Riverfront Park. Had the Historical Society not stepped in, this historic structure would have met the same fate (demolition!) as other homes in that area in order to make room for the new park.

Thanks to the cooperation of the city, this task force has been given time to work out a recovery plan which includes separating a "newer" addition (circa 1860) from the original log structure and then moving the home to a new site adjacent to the Daniel Gebhart Tavern Museum at the corner of Old Main and Lock Streets. There it will be set on a new foundation after demolition of the city owned "Little White House". The Little White House is not an historic structure, but was formerly used by the Historical Society for educational purposes prior to the move of their headquarters to the Market Square Building in the center of town. In its new location, the Kercher pioneer home will be restored and will become an important part of the educational programs provided by the Historical Society to the children and adults in the community.

The Board has voted unanimously to launch a Capital Funds Drive and has chosen **John O'Gorman** to head up this effort. The Fund Raising Committee is currently working with the Board to establish a realistic target which will address all costs associated with the move and restoration of the historic structure as well as associated landscaping at the new site. We are pleased to report that an anonymous pledge of \$25,000 has already been made as a dollar-for-dollar match for all donations up to that limit.

In the coming weeks you will learn more about how this broad based fund drive will operate to give <u>all</u> individuals, businesses, foundations, etc., an opportunity to support this unique drive to maintain an important part of Miamisburg's history. Including the Kercher home in the immediate vicinity of the Daniel Gebhart Tavern will enhance the educational programs that are enjoyed by countless school children and adults in the community. Another fun time for the Miamisburg Historical Society with the activities at the Spring Fling outing at Library Park and the Spring Fling Parade through the streets in Miamisburg. F of School Year for Educational Programs By Bobbye Sweny

Our May schedule always fills up rapidly for us. This year we topped all previous records. We gave six classroom programs, three walking tours with Gebhart Tavern visits, one tour of the Market Square Building with the Veteran's exhibit and two walking tours downtown to visit buildings under reconstruction. This involved approximately 238 children from 2nd and 3rd grades and from the high school. In addition, we had five wonderful young men from Jeanne Toadvine's Jr. High class who helped us clean the Tavern, the smokehouse and the Little White House.

If you consider that we saw 113 of these children 4 times, the count goes up to about 577 – that's a lot of children. The letters we get from the Bear School children are always a joy – we look forward to them. And the messages from the teachers, "Thanks from Kinder School to the Historical Society for all they do for the children of Miamisburg." And "Gratitude for an absolutely wonderful tour of Miamisburg. And thanks for showing and sharing with our students the rich history of our town!" from Medlar View.

pecial thanks to the wonderful docents who make this possible. In a Broerman, Judy Wuerstl and Diane McGloghlin joined Betty Morris, Jim Schnapp and me this year. If Rolla's daughter, Vi Hutchison from North Carolina, is in town, she always joins us with great enthusiasm. Then we have our stalwarts, Phil Johnson, Les Wead and Joe Steffen who open up the Tavern Museum for us ahead of time.

Phil and Les also gave tours of the Veteran's Exhibit while Rolla and I alternated a program on the Market Square Building, Memorial Day and the flag in the Miller Chamberlin Auditorium. Our special docent is our own Mayor, Dick Church, who greets the children on our walking tour with a challenge to follow their dreams. The children love meeting the Mayor.

We work with 14 teachers to schedule these programs. This year, one of our teachers asked to join the Society so we could supply her with the historic information she needs for a project to bring history to the third grade level. Her name is Lori Zastrow from Medlar View – we welcome her with open arms.

A special surprise for us this year was the H.V. Bear program. When the teachers asked for parent volunteers for the walking tour, expecting the usual six or seven, nineteen parents signed up. : had a wonderful time.


