Memorial Day Weekend 2010 "Lest We Forget"

Our 6th Annual Memorial Day Weekend is rapidly approaching. Please mark your calendar and plan to attend our events. The May 27 General Membership Meeting will be at Market Square at 7:00 pm and honors our military veterans from the Revolutionary War to the present. Our military exhibit will be open at the Market Square Building during our regular hours and Memorial Day, 1:00 to 4:00 pm. The Victory Dance will be held at the Baum Opera House on Sunday evening, May 30 from 7:00 to 10:00 pm, with music provided by the Hauer Swing Band. Tickets are \$7.50 per person and set-ups are provided. Funds generated help support the weekend events.

Library Celebrates 100th Anniversary

A Centennial Celebration is being planned to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the Miamisburg Branch of the Dayton Metro Library. On May 8 at 2:00 pm there will be an open house and program presented at the Carnegie Center and Miamisburg Library.

A little history - In 1908 the Monday Night Club, a local literary club, began a campaign to build a library in Miamisburg. Funding (\$12,500) was obtained from the Carnegie Foundation in December, 1908 and the library was built and dedicated on May 10, 1910.

Earlier this month I attended my first regional meeting of the Ohio Association of Historical Societies and Museums (OAHSM). These regional meetings are an opportunity to learn about different aspects of operating historical societies, museums and other organizations. We discussed fundraising, event planning and touched briefly on grant writing. It is also an opportunity to get to know those working with other local organizations and the types of activities in which they are involved. It was interesting for me to see how we stacked up against some of the other historical societies. Some are county-wide organizations; many of which have paid staff. I was pleased to see what a great organization we have, and the various projects we have undertaken over the past years, compared to others. Ours is an all volunteer force together with a lot of support from the Parks and Recreation Department of the City. We owe a special thank you to Doug Voss, who is always there to help.

Closer to home, I have been meeting informally, with the consent of the Historical Society Board, with Steve Kuhn, the Chairman of the Board of the Baum Opera House. I don't think it's any secret that the Baum is struggling to survive, as are many such organizations. The Baum is part of the rich tradition of this city, so we on the Historical Society Board thought it would be in the best interest of both organizations to work toward a more cooperative effort. We are not in a position, nor do we intend to provide financial support. Our hope for the future is that we can put together a committee composed of members of the Baum Opera House



Committee, the Historical Society, the Miamisburg Merchants Association and local business and civic leaders to explore ways that these organizations working together can continue to revitalize the downtown area. I will keep you posted as things develop.

Finally, one of my goals this year is to keep you informed on what's going on. The Board meets the third Thursday of each month at 6:00 pm on the second floor of the Market Square Building. Our meeting is open to the public, and if you are interested, please join us. Communication is a two way street. We on the Board also want to know what you want, and your ideas. If you have a suggestion on how we may improve what we are doing, or some worthwhile project you would like to see the Historical Society become involved in, please let us know. I can promise you that we will take it under consideration.

March General Program Features History of Transportation

Nancy Horlacher, Local History Specialist at the Dayton Metro Library, gave a great presentation and slide show on the history of transportation here in the Miami Valley. Despite the cool rainy evening, many of our members and friends turned

out for the March general program.

Ms. Horlacher began the presentation by showing the popular picture which we offer in our gift shop of the six modes of transportation. This picture was taken between Miamisburg and West Carrollton

along the "Hamilton Pike", or old Route 25 as it is now known. She described how early settlers came to this area by boat and also by land on horseback or horse drawn wagons.



The many modes of transportation from the early days to the present

were described in her presentation. From canoes and canal boats, horse drawn stagecoaches and Conestoga wagons, electric and rail trains to buses, automobiles and airplanes; they all were part of the settling and growth of our area. Examples of these early modes of transportation may be now seen at the Carillon Park Museum.

Plan on attending the celebration of our library which has been such a great asset to Miamisburg residents and a landmark in our community.


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Tebruary General Meeting Draws Large Crowd

Dorothy Lane Markets offer a program called "The Good Neighbor Club" which contributes a percentage of the amount of your purchases to our Historical Society. In order for this to take place you will need to register one time at the Dorothy Lane service desk for the Miamisburg Historical Society. At that point you will receive a Club Card.

When you use your Club Card it will automatically be registered to the Society's account. After your expenditures total \$500, anything over that amount, 1% will be given to the Society.

This operates on a yearly basis. You do not have to re-register each year, but the \$500 "deductible" starts over at the beginning of each new year. If enough people enroll in this program, the yearly check could be sizeable. It is a painless way to make I donation and in no way affects the price of your purchase.

Pop Quiz Answer


The correct answer is A. (1873)

The building served as an open air market for only 22 years. In 1870 there was a movement to close the market which had become, according to the news of that time, "a public garbage receptacle, a stench and a public nuisance."

By 1873 the market house had been remodeled and the arches bricked in. The downstairs now included two business rooms in front, a council chamber and a jail in the rear.
