Improvements for the Market Square Building

Pictured is a digital rendering of the new sign that will soon be installed on the east end of the Market Square Building. The canvas banner that hung there for quite some time certainly did not convey the importance this historic structure has for the city of Miamisburg. The new sign, being constructed by Insignia



Signs, will undoubtedly be in place by the end of January.

An even larger project that has been in the planning stage for over a year is the reconstruction of the front façade of the Market Square Building. The woodwork panels surrounding the windows and doors have deteriorated to the extent of allowing water to penetrate to the interior. In accordance with historic guidelines and to closely replicate the original design, new woodwork will be installed along with energy saving doors and windows which have already been ordered.

Funds for the renovation come from a grant that provides a sharing of the costs between the city (owners of the building) and the state. The Historical Society will incur some small costs due to cosmetic details that are deemed necessary. The entire façade renovation will be underway soon and is slated to be finished in early 2007.

We have an important historic structure in our care. It is essential that it is maintained and preserved for future generations.

Miamisburg's Armory

It has recently come to the attention of our Veteran's Committee that there was indeed an armory in Miamisburg. The March 8, 1900 edition of the *Miamisburg News* contains an article entitled, "New Military Company". It states, "Lieutenant H.G. Catrow and a number of other young men with him has again taken up the matter of organizing a military company which they are now pushing to a finish."

On March 22, 1900 the newspaper reads, "A new military company held an exceedingly interesting drill at the Mecca Hall on Tuesday evening." On April 5 the *News* headline announces, "Muster of Company H, Third Regiment O.N.G." This article reports, "Special Orders, No. 76, issued by the Adjutant General, directs Colonel C.B. Adams to muster the military company into the service of the State on Tuesday April 10th and hold an election for one captain, one first lieutenant and one second lieutenant. This will take place in the evening at Mecca Hall, at 8 o'clock. Major H.M. Taylor, Surgeon of the Fourth Infantry, will accompany Colonel Adams and make examination of those who wish to enter the company." The April 12 issue states that the required number of men, fifty-two, had been attained, the oath of service was taken and the company mustered into the service of the State of Ohio.

As soon as the company was sworn in, an election of officers took place resulting in the election of Herbert G. Catrow, Captain; John H. Karr, First Lieutenant; George W. Nusz, Second Lieutenant. Thus, Company H, Third Regiment, Ohio National Guard of Miamisburg was born. It was due to Captain Catrow's indefatigable efforts that the company was so quickly formed and mustered in. He was a graduate of Chester Military Institute of Chester, Pennsylvania and particularly well qualified.

The company quickly became the best in the state. Captain Catrow became Major Catrow and he contracted A.F. Gwinner for his warehouse building, at the corner of Linden and Second Streets, to be used for the new armory for Company H. The building (now used by Alcor Supply) was in excellent condition. The second floor was arranged as the drill hall and the first floor for the use of officers and company.

Thus we have the history of the Armory in Miamisburg. We know where the Armory was located, but our dilemma is that no one seems to know where the "Mecca" building was located. Mecca Hall is mentioned in all the old articles as being the meeting site used while the military company was being formed. If you can shed some light on the location of this building, please contact Veteran's Committee Chairman, Randy Staley at 885-4458.



Excerpts from the Staley Diaries

The Historical Society has recently acquired the diaries of Isaac Staley. He was born July 3, 1836 in "Shakersville", three miles east of Dayton. This may possibly be in the area of what is now Wayne Avenue and Watervliet Avenue. His father died when Isaac was just over a year old. Isacc's mother, Salome, always referred to as Sara, moved him to Miamisburg a few years after the death of his father.

Isaac Staley was confirmed in the Lutheran Church by Rev. Heincke and sang in the choir for years, including the event of the dedication of that church. Many times he would attend two services a day at different churches, one being in English, the other in German.

The family farm was located at Miami Township, Lot 33 on Miamisburg Centerville Pike (the Toll House), now the location of Ron's BP station on Central Avenue. His mother bought the land around 1850.

On March 6, 1865 he married Harriet Ann Coleman. They had three sons and two daughters. Isaac was a very active farmer, however he also served as a Township Trustee, Chairman of Elections, School Board Member for 24 years and President of that Board at the time of his death.

He died December 19, 1903 at his home. His obituary said, "He was a man of careful habits, strictly honest and kept a daily journal ever since the year 1861."

Following is an excerpt from Isaac Staley's diaries which take place in the days around Christmas in 1864. Our Society is very fortunate to be in possession of these writings which give us a glimpse of everyday life in that era.

December 19th Monday 1864
Striped tobacco nearly all day took 2 more throughs more down and to German choir Meeting paid .30 cts for 1/2 lb of candy and retired 10 O'

December 20th Tuesday
Striped tobacco all day and bubs Mother
washed for us Mother not being well
to singing in the eaving for Christmas
a gift of one \$1 Dollar to H and retired about 10
paid 35 cts for candy again

<u>December 21 Wednesdy</u> Me and John striped tobacco again all day and retired early.

December 22nd Thursday

Very cold to day – I went to Lambs Mill and got \$11.50 worth of feed in the forenoon, and fetched my new <u>Spring Wagon</u> in the afternoon for 155.00. not settled for. R E

December 23rd Friday
Worked a little around the house then went to
town with some Eggs 5 Dozens @ 25 c - 1.25
received paymt
to Choir Meeting in the eaving
paid .25 cts for coat Butons retired Early

December 24th Saturday
I was about home till Noon
Went to the election for Esq. Goudy
was Electit,
got medicine for Mother for 50 cts paid
she not being well
to Christmas tree celebration
to Whitmyer [?] Harriet [R?] home early

December 25th Sunday
To sundy school they gave the things from the tree to the children and German preaching in the forenoon then home and Mother not better yet
Mary played the organ to town and English preaching in the eavning and retired early Cost 40

December 26th Monday
Striped tobacco all day by myself
off what I had down from last season
to German Choir meeting in the eaving
mary played paid .30 for tobacco
retired early


The excitement of opening gifts on Christmas morning has come and gone, but for us it's like that throughout the whole year with each donated collection. Imagine sitting down in front of a dusty box or perhaps a suitcase heavy with its content ...opening it ...and WOW, the treasures that sometimes emerge!

We recently received just such a suitcase, chock-full of old photographs from Donny Miller. And what a collection—never before seen photographs of the 1913 flood and the reconstruction of the flood damaged railway through Miamisburg.

Another picture collection of Miamisburg's Main Street past was donated by Tom Silberman. It includes a photo of the Deutsche Apothecary or the A.L. Silberman's Pharmacy (pictured below) at the corner of Main and Central Ave. In the photograph is a one of a kind image of the Market Square Building with a Post Office sign next to the entrance. These donated collections and hopefully many more to come, continue to build our accessioned collection of photographs of historic Miamisburg.

We all experienced the fun and excitement of discovering the log home of Jacob Kercher at 14 West Ferry Street and with crowbars and hammers in hand, peeling away almost two centuries of paint layers, wallpaper and plaster lath to expose the massive timbers of the original log structure. Jacob Kercher built this log house between 1808 and 1809. His daughter, Elizabeth, was born in this home in 1809, perhaps the first child to be born in what is now Miamisburg.

The Historic Research and Resource Committee ended this fruitful year with a Christmas Party for volunteers on Tuesday, December 12th. We look forward to 2007 with excited anticipation. With the dedicated work of our volunteers and the generosity of donators, we will expand Miamisburg 's Historical Society's over 12,000 accessioned items, enriching the collected history of Miamisburg and whetting our appetites for new discoveries.




