April Program Will Highlight Plans For 2018 Bicentennial

shaven. The women sewed 1800's dresses and matching outfits for the children. There were style shows, antique shows, a professionally directed pageant at Harmon Field, a cow milking contest, several parades, and numerous other fun events which kept everyone very busy for over a week.

Society's March General Program Featured First-Hand Account Of 1986 Miamisburg Train Derailment

Our March 26, General Program at Market Square was very well attended as Billy Ring gave a presentation and slide show on the CSX train derailment that occurred on the west side of Miamisburg. Billy Ring was, at that time, Captain and paramedic at the Miamisburg Fire Department and served as spokesman to the media. At the program, he was able to give folks a much better idea of what happened during that event and many facts that were not revealed at the time.

For those who were not living here in 1968, this accident was historic in scope and involved the evacuation of approximately twenty thousand residents in the community and surrounding areas. On July 8, 1986 at 4:25 pm, a southbound freight train, consisting of an engine and forty-four cars



derailed while traveling over the bridge spanning Bear Creek on the west side of the Miami River. Fifteen of the cars derailed, one of which contained phosphorus. The Miamisburg Fire Department, headed by Chief Bob Menker, and fourteen area fire departments were involved in containing the fire which raged for five days.





Heritage Village Opens For The Season on May 3

We know you read all about our Heritage Village in *The Tavern Log*, but have you actually been there? These two historic structures, both built in the early 1800's have been restored and outfitted in period furnishings by our Historical Society.

The Daniel Gebhart Tavern Museum is on its original site and not only serves as a museum, but also a venue for several of our Historical Society events. An interesting

note—when Daniel Gebhart wanted to build and operate a tavern, he was only 19 years old. A historic record indicates that his mother, Catherine, went to Dayton in September of 1811 and secured the license for him.

The Kercher Pioneer Home (at left) is the second building at Heritage Village and was moved from Ferry Street to this location in 2008. It was built in 1809 by early settler, Jacob Kercher, and is where he raised his two sons and eight daughters. Although it is covered by lap siding on three sides, the log structure may be seen on the back and interior of the building. The Society has furnished it as a one room school house on the first floor and a children's museum on the second floor. It serves the community well as a local history teaching facility for hundreds of Miamisburg third graders and other children which are brought through each year.

If you've never visited Heritage Village before, make a point to get there some Sunday this spring or summer. Our volunteers are on hand and anxious to show you around from 2:00 to 5:00 on Sunday afternoons. (May through October) Thanks go out to the City of Miamisburg and to all our volunteers for doing their part in enabling the Society to keep these historic buildings open and available to the public.

Heritage Village is located at the corner of Old Main and Lock Street in Miamisburg. It sits alongside the Miami River levee and is accessible from the bike path.

Venue is Changed for Miamisburg Alumni Dinner/Dance

Due to the closing of the Wyndham Gardens Hotel late last summer, the Alumni Association was forced to begin looking for a new venue for the Annual Dinner/Dance. Stop In At Market Square To See Our Latest Display

In the North Gallery of the Market Square Building, a new display of pharmaceutical items has been set up. Items used in the 'olden days' are on display, along with a list of physicians (from 1811). These are all artifacts from collections given to the Society.

Among the items are:

A unique list of diseases, and the booklet, "The History of Medicine in Miamisburg, Ohio" written by the late C. E. Gebhart, M.D.

Two excerpts from this booklet:

- Article from the Bulletin Newspaper, January 24, 1873. "Ear Wax – its uses. It keeps the ear moist and is a deadly poison to insects."
- Article from Bulletin Newspaper, May 8, 1874. "Cure for lockjaw pour warm turpentine on the wound (also a remedy for croup by saturating a cloth with it and putting it on the chest)."



More Facts About the July 8, 1986 Train Derailment

- Police departments from 53 jurisdictions carried out a massive evacuation of the city and surrounding areas. This evacuation was the largest associated with a train derailment in US history.
- Road blocks were set up on roads leading to the restricted area; citizens attempting to enter this area were turned back.
- Rail cars involved in the fire contained phosphorus, animal fat, new vehicles and newsprint.
- The fire was thought to be coming under control the following day, until the phosphorus car shifted in the wreckage and exploded.
- Flames were above tree top level and emitting a smoke plume that rose 1500 feet in the air, drifting in a northeast direction.
- The night of July 10 was complicated by the passage of severe winds and rain which forced the relocation of the Command Post as the plume shifted in that direction.
- On the morning of July 11, the tan¹ car was still burning with no let up, and again the Command Post was temporarily evacuated as winds shifted.
- When the fire was eventually extinguished, the tank car was pulled ahead to a bed of sand and opened. The remaining content was emptied into drums for disposal.
