Our "Winter Wonderland" Float Was Beautiful!

The 2013 Community Holiday Parade float theme was "Holiday Movies". For our float, we selected the 1947 film, "Winter Wonderland". Our float would feature the 1800's sleigh that was donated to the Society by John and Diane Warrick. John reminisces that when he was about six years old, he and his father rode in the sleigh though the snowy fields around Germantown, pulled by their farm horse, "Old Ned".

Gary Petticrew e-mailed the members asking for a trailer on which to build the float. Lee Hieronymus answered the plea with a 16' flat bed trailer and pickup truck, with Lee as the driver. Before work on the float could begin, the sleigh had to be moved from the barn at Heritage Village. Wayne Burgett loaded the sleigh onto his pickup truck with the help of Jim Bornhorst and Judy and Don Wuerstl, and it was transported to the Bornhorst complex.

Our sponsor for the float was Miamisburg's Ace Hardware. Manager, Lyle Anthony and associate, Doug Campbell, not only provided the materials (lights, snow/cotton, trees and mountain stream), they also constructed the float. All the work was done at the warehouse and garage of Jim and Laura Bornhorst, who provided the generator for the lighted stream and trees. In keeping with our snow theme, Randy and Melanie Staley donated green garland which was sprayed white and used to trim the edge of the float.

It was a BEAUTIFUL float, one we thought would surely win a prize, but the Holiday Parade was cancelled due to inclement weather.

Since we didn't get to "parade" our float, we decided to display it at the Rotary Pancake Day at the high school the following Saturday. With the help of Joe Stanton, we were approved and ready to go, but alas and alack, the weather once again interfered.

Before the float was dismantled, John and Diane Warrick, came to the warehouse and boarded the sleigh in their 1940's winter finery and lots of photos were taken by Laura Bornhorst. A few days later Judy, Diane and I dismantled it. We packed the materials and returned them to Ace Hardware where they are stored. The 2014 parade will have the same theme, so we will have everything needed to reassemble the float.

In the meantime, Larry Suttman, Curator, has rearranged the floor displays at the Market Square Building to make room for the sleigh, which now has a safe and dry permanent home. We are fortunate to add the sleigh to our archival treasures. Stop by when you get a chance and see first hand this picturesque mode of winter transportation from the 1800's.

Kudos to Ace Hardware and all who donated time, labor, facilities, vehicles and materials, while exhibiting a positive *esprit de corps* for the event.

Growing Up In Miamisburg (My Early Work Experiences)

Excerpts from a memoir written by Warner Forbes (1914 - 1995)

I believe I may have been the first person to sell snacks at football games. Mother would pop corn, put in sacks and I would take a basket full and go through the stands at Harmon Field, selling it for 5¢ a bag.

When I was about sixteen I gave up passing the Dayton Herald and took up the job of passing the Sunday Cincinnati Enquirer. The entire town was my route and it had to be done by car. My friend, Walt Miller, would go along just for the fun of it almost every Sunday. Occasionally his brother Karl (also my good friend) would come along too. After we had completed our route, we always stopped at Silberman's Drug Store where Carl Silberman ran it on Sunday mornings. Carl was about two or three years older than I. Carl always left for the restroom when we got in, and left us in charge of the store. We would each get a cigar and a *Paris Nights* or some similar magazine and put them in our paper sack. I recall mother finding one I had stashed under the carpet in my bedroom. She lectured me pretty good.

The Cincinnati Enquirer did not have a newsboy's day like the Dayton papers. We didn't think that was quite fair, so we decided to have our own. We went around before daylight hammering on peoples' doors and shouting "Newsboy's Day". It is a wonder someone didn't shoot us. I recall hitting up Dr. Hartwell, a dentist, for his contribution. He came to the upstairs window in his nightshirt and responded by saying he would see me in Sunday School. He kept his word and contributed.

I believe it was in the summer after my graduation that I got my first regular job. I worked for a time in Therman Waters' filling station which was located where the Peerless Mill Inn is today. I don't remember much about it except having to hand pump the gas up into a glass cylinder and then it was gravity fed into the car's gas tank. There was a pit over which you drove your car for an oil change. It cost 15¢ a quart and was kept in 50 gallon drums from which you pumped it. Just a summer job.

I think it was late in 1933 when I got a job at Rost's Bakery. My primary job was cleaning the pans and the big mixers, but there were other duties too. One of the jobs I hated most was helping the baker unload the bread pans from the oven. It was my job to pick up the ten loaves of hot bread that had come out of greased pans and put them on a rack to cool. They did not permit you to use gloves because the grease would make the gloves black and that would transfer to the bread. You soon learned to keep alternating the fingers that were in contact with the bread to keep from burning them. Another problem with this job was that sometimes you had to put icing on the cakes. If you happened to damage a cake, it was taken out of your pay.

My hours at Rost's were from 5:00 am until 1:00 pm Tuesday through Friday. On Saturdays and Mondays, I had to come in at midnight of the night before and work through the night until 1:00 pm the next day. After working all night Sunday, by Monday morning, I was dead on my feet. When it got too bad, I would make some comment favoring Franklin Roosevelt, and Walter Rost would get so mad he would send me home. Finally one of the other employees tipped him off to what I was doing.

I also got a job at Hoffman's Pool Room on Saturday afternoons, racking pool balls, collecting money from the card tables (5¢ per game) and helping out at the soda fountain. There was no alcohol served there.





There Are Some Things That Never Change

The photo at right was taken at the Mound Golf Course in 1985. It could have been taken in winter of 1945 or even today in 2014, for many generations of Miamisburg kids, and adults too, have been sledding on this hill.

When school was called off because of snow, we couldn't wait to meet our friends and head out to the golf course. We flew down the hill with sleds, inner tubes or even pieces of cardboard. Occasionally some of the high school boys would show up with something as outlandish as a car hood, which attracted a lot of attention, but didn't really work all that well. And talk about safety issues!



In good conditions, the quick trip down the hill could be quite an exhilarating and bumpy ride. The trip back up was exhausting and required some recuperation when finally reaching the top. If you grew up in Miamisburg, chances are good that you sped down this snow covered hill many times over the years. I'd be willing to bet that you also remember trudging back home afterward, dragging your sled and completely worn out, with frozen toes, soggy gloves and a sore tailbone... but all things considered, it was well worth it, wasn't it!
