

### Paying Homage to a Dedicated Former Historical Society Member

On May 25th, a group of family and friends gathered at the gazebo in Library Park, to celebrate the life of Connie (Kline) Painter, who passed away in May. Connie joined the Historical Society in June of 1993, during Miamisburg's 175th birthday celebration. She was an enthusiastic, dedicated historian and genealogist, with a deep commitment to learning all she could about her new hometown, and preserving its historic heritage.

During this strong growth period for the Society, Connie served four years as Secretary of the Board. She was involved in the acquisition and renovation of the Market Square Building and especially in establishing our organization as a "Certified Historical Society" for the state of Ohio.

One of the Society's dreams was to establish a Research and Resource Library to house the growing historical collection being donated to the Society. Connie took over this task with great enthusiasm. With the help of Dawn Dewey, head of the Wright State Historical Library, Connie not only set up the library, but succeeded in attaining grants to pay for equipment and supplies. She will be remembered for her outstanding exhibit on the Tobacco Industry and for heading the committee to videotape the history of Miamisburg at the cable network. So long as there is a Research and Resource Library operating at the Historical Society, Connie's legacy will live on.

### Saying Goodbye to the Anna K. Wantz Building (Intermediate Building)

In early April, demolition was begun on the Wantz Building on Sixth Street in Miamisburg. In earlier years it was known as the Intermediate Building and through various eras housed the 4<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grades.

Built in 1927-28, additions were added in 1957 and 1959. All who attended school there will certainly remember the old school bell that stood out in front. The bell originally came from the 1848 Miamisburg


schoolhouse. Except for storage, the Wantz structure had been out of use since 2011.

The building was named for long time teacher, Anna K. Wantz, who passed away in 1978. She was well known, loved and respected as a no nonsense, but fair teacher. Most will remember Mrs. Wantz especially for her penmanship classes.

Many local people were gathering around to watch, and reliving bygone days as the Wantz Building came down in April.

Once again this year our Historical Society Veterans Committee, under the direction of Randy Staley, and local American Legion Post 165 with Commander Wayne Kern, have provided this community with a variety of meaningful Memorial Day Weekend events. West Carrollton VFW Post 3438 also participated in our Silver Taps Ceremony at Market Square, and we thank them.

"Silver Taps" was held on Thursday evening preceding Memorial Day weekend. The program featured Mr. Fred Lynch as speaker and he gave us an up-close and personal look at the daily lives of Civil War soldiers. 



### **Notes From The Curator**

The Miamisburg Historical Society continues to receive many artifacts and memorabilia from current and former "Miamisburg-ers". We are fortunate to be the recipient of Allen Jones' lifetime collection of beautifully bound postcard albums and nearly 200 first issue, scale model replicas of John Deere and many other early automobiles, commercial vehicles and farm implements, including two complete, original boxed sets of rare toy farms made in Czechoslovakia—the list is too extensive to present here. But that's not all. He has also gifted memorabilia and historical documents he collected during his two tours of duty in Vietnam.

Allen was also a 31-year employee of the Bell Telephone Company and was present at the break-up several years ago when he retired. Many of his Bell historic documents along with his framed tee-shirt "Breaking Up Is Hard To Do" will greatly enhance our collection covering the Bell Telephone Exchange. (Now the building annex to the Miamisburg Senior Citizens Center on Central Avenue.)

The picture at right, taken at the Miamisburg Historical Society, is of Allen L. Jones (MHS Class of '63) with a plaque of the ship he helped commission and served on during his two Vietnam tours (1965-67). The plaque depicts the Warship USS Waddell DDG-24 Crest. The plaque is made from spent powder casings that were fired during the first tour in Vietnam in 1965-66. There were only 15 of these made and only a few have survived. According to Allen, the Warship USS Waddell DDG-24 was commissioned on August 28, 1964 and decommissioned on October 1, 1992. The ship was then sold for \$1.00 to the Hellenic Navy (Greece), and ultimately used for target practice and sunk in the Mediterranean Sea. The Warship USS Waddell DDG-24 was named "Top Gun" of the Vietnam War since the ship fired more five inch, 54 caliber rounds than any other ship that was involved in the war.

A partial history of the ship's war service and awards:

- It was the first US ship to be fired upon since the Korean War. The North Vietnamese shore gun battery was subsequently destroyed and there are photos of the smoke rising from the debris in the collection at the Society.
- The ship exceeded 40 knots in speed which was the fastest Guided Missile Destroyer ever built, and was awarded the Marjorie Sterrett Award which recognized her as the "Best Ship in the US Navy Fleet" which is no small feat.
- The ship earned eleven Battle Stars (Allen Jones was part of the crew which earned six of these Battle Stars) and two US Navy Commendation Medals. The ship earned the reputation as the "Busiest Ship in the Gulf".

Allen donated to the Society many artifacts he collected and saved while serving in the US Navy (1963-67). Contact Randy Staley (937-859-5000) or visit the Market Square Building on any Wednesday or Saturday from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm to view them. One item is a walking cane made from spent 50 caliber shell casings fired at waterborne craft off the coast of Vietnam during the first tour in Vietnam. It was made and given to Allen by a shipmate for aiding him in securing his VA benefits.

Thanks to Allen and many others, our historic collections are growing by leaps and bounds—we currently digitally document nearly 15,000 artifacts. Unfortunately the Society is woefully lacking in space to display many of these, especially the larger ones, currently in storage. We are seeking a new, much larger Miamisburg History Museum and would welcome your input and volunteer efforts to make it happen.

### Local Children Learn About Miamisburg History
