

# Fall 2015 Very Productive For Media Group

John Warrington and Kevin Scheuller interviewed Dr. Bob Bowman and Harriet Foley of the Franklin Area Historic Society in the first of several shows highlighting the History of the Miami Valley Chautauqua. The first show detailed the first 50 years of Chautauqua from 1896 through 1946. In the second show, current director, Jerry Harmeyer, gave a 'walking tour' of the present day Chautauqua grounds and spoke of the history of older structures still in existence and the role they played in making this site a summer attraction for over 100 years.

Carol O'Connell was very busy completing a number of interesting programs during the fall. She taped two 30 minute programs on the 1986 CSX Train Derailment, interviewing the then deputy fire chief Billy Ring. The programs detailed the largest evacuation of citizens ever resulting from a chemical spill resulting from a train accident and included rare TV footage and interviews with key figures to the disaster. Next, Carol interviewed the past commander of the I.O.O.F who gave a very interesting narrative on the history of I.O.O.F and the building in downtown Miamisburg. Finally, Carol interviewed Ron's Pizza proprietor, Ron Holp, in his downtown restaurant last month. Ron, with both humor and uncanny recollection of events, told his story of building the pizza business up from a tiny storefront in downtown Miamisburg in the early 60's to the successful business that it is today.

Work is currently underway to finish the Chautauqua history series with interviews of former and current residents of the Chautauqua area to be taped early next year. Carol O'Connell has several projects planned including a program on the importance of the paper industry and mills along the river and canal from West Carrollton, Miamisburg and Franklin. Another program will reveal the history of the Old Twine Mill across the river on Upper Miamisburg Road. Finally, she wants to look at the history of Fox Motors, the oldest car dealership in Miamisburg. One more program on the history of the Monsanto Corporation is planned on the tritium program, the research and products that were developed at the Mound during the 1970's through the 1990's.

### Gebhart Descendants Visit Miamisburg

Gary and Nita Petticrew hosted Tim England and his mother, Darlene Gebhart England who travelled from Grand Rapids, Michigan to trace their Gebhart ancestry back to Miamisburg. A friend told them about St. John's Cemetery on Gebhart Church Road, so they decided to make their journey of discovery. Darlene Gebhart England is the 4th great-granddaughter of George Gebhart who left Ohio in the early 1800's for Michigan.

After visiting the St. John's Cemetery, they next travelled to Hillgrove Cemetery in Miamisburg to find the burial site of the 6th great-grandparent, Nicholas Gebhart (b. 1/17/1765). Nicholas is laid to rest next to John Jacob LaRose, who established the Union Congregation at St. John's around 1804.

While here in town, Tim and Darlene took the opportunity to visit the Gebhart Tavern at Heritage Village while we were having our Old Time Craft Day, as well as the historic, St. Jacob Lutheran Church. Tim had the thrill of climbing the 100 feet to the top of the bell tower to see the silver-cast bell.

### **Unexpected Delight**

You never know when an out of the blue person spontaneously breaks through your hectic hubbub of activity. It happened to Historical Society volunteers and visitors at the Market Square Building on Veterans Day. Society member, Jim "Two-Hawks" Caldwell, stopped by and introduced Joseph Mato Whitefeather. The two had participated earlier at the Veteran's Day memorial services in Library Park.

As Jim introduced Joseph, everyone gathered around and noticed his beautifully handcrafted wooden flute. We later learned that Joseph had made the flute he carried and that it embodies the craftsmanship of the people of our Native American Indian Tribes.

It wasn't long before everyone in the building dropped what they were busy doing and gathered around Joseph to hear his story and to listen to the warm, rich, soulful and calming melodies of the Native American flute. He explained that the deep richness of its tone came from not only the size and length of the c-flat flute, but the precise placement of the finger positions, their size and how the air flow through the flute is both divided and expelled and passed through the mouth piece simultaneously.

Truly a wonderful happening not anticipated! Nearly 40 volunteers and visitors to our museum that day got to experience this gifted man of Native American ancestry, his story and the reverence for his heritage he displayed.



#### **Notes From The Curator**

I was trying to think of something to write about for this issue of the Tavern Log, about the many good things that have happened to and for the Miamisburg Historical Society this past year. But instead I'm going to share a bit of Miamisburg History that I, for one, did not know much about. We, Larry Suttman and I, discovered it while doing research for a new *History of Miamisburg, the First 200 Years* for Bicentennial release in 2018.

It is about Vincent Groby Apple. Ever heard of him? He is one of two men from Ohio to become holders of the world's records for the number of inventions to their credit: Thomas A. Edison and Vincent G. Apple.

Vincent was born on a farm near Miamisburg, Ohio, January 26, 1874, and spent the early years of his life in Miamisburg. His parents were Martin F. and Mary H. (Groby) Apple. He was educated in the public schools, most likely School House #9 on Heincke Road. Number 9 still exists as a private home just north and one field away from Kroger's on Heincke, and near where Apple was probably born. The Apple farm bordered Richard Street going north from the top of Heincke Hill. In oral Miamisburg history, that area was known as Apple Town. Although he graduated from a commercial school, he never went to college. His engineering and scientific knowledge was acquired through his own efforts as a student. His inventive genius was a gift.

In 1892, when only a boy of 18 years of age, he organized the Franklin Electric Company, with a capitalization of \$100,000 to manufacture toy motors. The business succeeded and a few years later he organized the Dayton Electric and Manufacturing Company for the production of ignition equipment for stationary engines. In 1895 he had developed and built the first dynamo used for ignition on internal combustion engines, and in 1896 he built the first dynamo engine ignition system utilizing dry batteries.

In 1903 his magneto ignition system was used by the Wright brothers in their flyers at Kitty Hawk. He went on to originate the lighting and ignition systems used in cars, planes and boats through the 1930s. He invented what some believe to be the first electric self-starter, and also designed the flywheel magneto eventually used in Henry Ford's Model T automobiles. In 1899 he was one of the original incorporators of the Dayton Electrical Manufacturing Company, which became a key supplier of engine parts for the Wright brothers. Vincent continued to improve aspects of automobile starters, lighting and engines throughout his career. He sited among his friends both Thomas Edison and Henry Ford.

Edison was granted approximately 1,000 patents on his inventions in a lifetime of 84 years. Vincent G. Apple, who died in his most productive period at the age of 58, had more than 350 patents issued in his name as inventor. Approximately 130 applications were pending in the patent office at the time of his death, and he was working, at the time, on 265 other inventions upon which his heirs and legal representatives could file applications for patents, bringing the total to 745. Had he patented all of his inventions, some of which have been worth millions to others, he could have had some 1,500 to his credit. In the year 1931, the year before his death, he had more patents issued to him than any other inventor.

Vincent G. Apple was well acquainted with Edison, and often visited him. When Vincent Apple became a member of one of the great engineering societies of the country, Thomas A. Edison was his sponsor. A part, at least, of the history of Vincent G. Apple's pioneering genius is recorded for posterity in the United States Patent Office and in the devices he originated, some of which are now arranged in a permanent exhibit in the Smithsonian Institution, the United States national museum at Washington DC. As a man of works instead of words, he will be known to posterity—a man from Miamisburg.

# **Miamisburg Homecoming Parade 2015**

You say you missed this year's homecoming parade because of the weather? It was a cold, windy and rainy evening, but Greg and Jean Wartinger braved the elements to drive our 1918 Willys Overland in the parade. They transported their daughter, Sarah, and Troy Good, who were homecoming king and queen last year. In addition, Historical Society member, Virginia Kinderdine, Class of 1935, was honored as the Burg's first drum majorette.


