Hill Grove Civil War Soldiers' Stones Project

On Saturday, July 11, a work party organized by Life Scout Mitchell Hopper, Troop 425 of Centerville, began searching for broken head stones of 15 Civil War Veterans in an area known as the Soldiers Lot at Hill Grove Union Cemetery. Over the years the broken stones were overgrown with sod. With the assistance of Cemetery Superintendent Wade Collins, the four lots were measured and lined out. The entire area was probed and potential digs were flagged. In all, 15 stones were excavated, cleaned, catalogued and placed on gravel beds where they were found.

Eleven veteran's stones were found in line along the east side of lots 833 and 862. All were broken and in need of replacement. Four civilian stones were also found in the same area. The work party of at least 20 scouts, families and friends spent about four hours of hard work to complete the job. I would like to thank Terry Easton of Springboro History for his assistance and expertise in cemetery preservation. Hopefully there will be another project in the adjacent Miamisburg Corporation Lots where civilian remains were moved from Library Park and the Canal Cemeteries around 1863.

History of Chautauqua Featured at September General Program

We revisited the past as Jerry Harmeyer of the Chautauqua Community Center presented a great program for our September General Meeting. He provided a slide show of photos dating from 1901 to the present. He spoke of the days when a walkway spanned the Miami River and provided an easy entrance to the park from the traction line which was

on the east side of the river.

The park originally served as a place for religious gatherings, but later evolved into more of an amusement park

setting. We all enjoyed seeing the old photos of boaters on the river, the skating rink, the kiddie rides, the swimming pool and the old buildings. Because of arson, many of the original buildings are now gone.

Jerry Harmeyer

Mr. Harmeyer currently runs a youth camp at Chautauqua. The last portion of his presentation showed Chautauqua as it is today. The old pool has been renovated and is still very much in use. Many new buildings have been built and during the summer, housing is available for 600 children and counselors. The camp is Christian oriented and provides a fun and safe place for children of all ages to enjoy. It's great to see that Chautauqua is still alive and serving a very useful purpose. Our thanks to Mr. Harmeyer for his great presentation.

Searching For Clues

We'd love to have more information about Daniel Gebhart, the proprietor of our Gebhart Tavern during the early

1800's. What we know: He was born on July 12, 1791 in Berks County, Pennsylvania. Daniel was the youngest of six children born to Valentine Gebhart and Anna Catharina Haag Gebhart. The family eventually migrated to the area that would become Miamisburg.

In 1810 Valentine Gebhart died. This left Daniel, at the age of 19, with the responsibility of the care of his mother and a need to earn a living. In 1811, permits needed to operate a tavern were obtained (in his mother's name, as he was not yet of age). At the same time a marriage license was taken out for Daniel and Mary "Polly" Eagle. The couple was married on July 25, 1811.

Daniel operated the tavern with his wife, Polly, until sometime in the mid 1830's. It is thought that the couple moved from Miamisburg to Indiana I from there to Pentwater, Michigan.

What we don't know: Did Daniel and Polly have any children. Are there descendents in this area or elsewhere? If you have any knowledge or family documentation regarding this couple (Gebhart or Eagle) that could tell us more about their lives, please call the Society at 859-5900 and leave a message for Les Wead.

Ohio 93rd Volunteer Infantry Honor Guard Re-enactors

What a Great Memorial Day Weekend!

Due to summer vacations and *Tavern Log* printing dates, we're just now able to bring you this news article on the Memorial Day Weekend. Every year I get a great surprise or two during our events. This year my Civil War re-enactor friends, Jeff Gallagher, Mark Holbrook, Mike Rusch and Dan Schoun marched as the 93rd Ohio Volunteer Infantry Honor Guard. Company E of that Regiment was known as the "Burg Boys". They marched from Dayton all the way to Atlanta and back to Nashville from August, 1862 to June, 1865. Along the way they engaged in 18 major battles and numerous skirmishes. My Great Grandfather John Conley Gebhart served with Company E, as did William Kinderdine and over 50 more area men.

The 34 star National Colors the Honor Guard carried this year is an exact replica of the 93rd Flag, listing each battle in gold letters on the red stripes. The real chiller is, on May 31, 1868, the Honor Guard marched the same route past Library Park to Hill Grove Cemetery and back again for our first Memorial Day Service in the Park 142 years ago.
