SYMPOSIUM FACILITATORS

Dr David Martin is a former Headmaster of a state school in the United Kingdom. He taught leadership courses at the University of Amsterdam and lectured at Oxford University. Dr. Martin has been an International Consultant for Secondary School Modernization in Trinidad and Tobago and in Guyana. He has, also, worked for the Inter-American Development Bank, and has served as Co-Director of Developing Schools and Services for Democracy in Europe and in Oxford. In addition, he has served as a Research Fellow in Comparative Education and Development programmes at the University of Reading

Dr F. King Alexander is a notable alumnus of St. Peter's College, University of Oxford. He has served as president and professor of four large public universities including California State University Long Beach, Louisiana State University, and Oregon State University. He is currently a professor of educational leadership and policy at Florida Gulf Coast University, a Senior Faculty Fellow at the Education Policy Center at the University of Alabama and a Faculty Affiliate at the Cornell University Higher Education Research Institute. He has published widely in academic journals and contributed to many media sources including The Economist, The Washington Post, the Financial Times, Politico, Inside Higher Education, the Chronicle of Higher Education, the Hechinger Report and the Times Higher Education (THE) Times of London.

Dr M. David Alexander is a Professor at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, Blacksburg, VA. He received his Doctor of Education from Indiana University. His honors include School of Education International Outreach Award (2009), Virginia Tech Alumni International Award (2009), the College of Education's Distinguished Service Award, and Phi Beta Delta, Honor Society for International Scholars for his contributions to International Education. In 2014 the National Council of Professors of Educational Administration (NCPEA) awarded him the Living Legend Award. He is co-author of five books, one of which, American Public School Law, is currently in its ninth edition. He is also co-author of Law of Schools, Students and Teachers in a Nutshell, seventh edition, 2022. Alexander has received four (4) Fulbright-Hays grants funded for study abroad in China and has been the principal investigator on numerous other grants. He has been a member of the Education Law Association since 1965. He was on the Education Law Association Board 1980-82, Vice-President (2005), and President (2007). His research interests are law, finance, policy studies, and international comparative education.
