GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

This is a Standard Flower Show conforming to the standards of the *Handbook for Flower Shows, Revised 2017*, with revisions printed in the *National Gardener*.

- All entries will be received at the Memorial Building on Monday, October 18th, 2021, from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm.
- All exhibits must be removed on Monday, October 25th, 2021 from 2:00 pm until 3:00 pm. Prize money will be available at this time at the Civic Center on Liberty Street.
- Registration is required for all entries. Application forms can be obtained from the Fair Office or from the Fair website (www.sumterfair.com). The registration deadline is Noon, Thursday, October 14th, 2021
- Judging will take place at 1:00 pm on Tuesday, October 19th, 2021. The decision of the judges is final. Awards may be withheld if not merited. Only required personnel will be allowed in the Exhibition Hall during judging. The presence of the following chairmen is required during judging: Superintendent, Council President, Flower Show Consultant, Judges Chairman, and Classification Chairman. Photographers may take pictures before or after judging but not during judging.
- Plant material on the **South Carolina Adopted Conservation List** (p. 19) and the list of **South Carolina Invasive Plants Banned from NGC Flower Shows** (p.20) may not be used. No artificial plant material is allowed in any division.
- The show is open to any amateur gardener in Sumter, Lee, Clarendon and Kershaw Counties.
- The Fair Management and Flower Show Chairmen will exercise the utmost care in the protection of all exhibits but will not be responsible for loss or damage.

STATEMENT OF NATIONAL GARDEN CLUBS TOP AWARDS

(May be awarded to an outstanding design scoring 95 or above)

In the Horticultural Division, a minimum of three classes in each Section listed in the Schedule is required in order to offer a National Garden Clubs Top Award. The Design Division must include at least three Classes of four entries each in order to offer a Section award. There is no minimum number of exhibits required except that there must be a minimum of five Classes with 20 exhibits in all.

SECTION 1

DESIGN

Designer's Choice Award

May be awarded to the blue-ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in DESIGNER'S CHOICE, Classes 1, 2 and 3. The Award is \$10 and a Rosette of three Purple Ribbons.

Petite Award

May be awarded to the most outstanding petite design in a show of otherwise full-sized designs. The Award is \$10 and a Small Rosette of Blue and White Ribbons.

EDUCATION

Educational Top Exhibitor Award

Awarded to the blue-ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in EDUCATION, Exhibits 7 and 8. The award is \$10 and a Rosette of Brown and White Ribbons.

YOUTH

Youth Top Exhibitor Award

May be awarded to the blue-ribbon winner scoring 90 or above in YOUTH, Classes 9, 10 and 11. The Award is \$10 and a Rosette of Red, White and Blue Ribbons.

SECTIONS 2 -5

HORTICULTURE

Arboreal Award

Awarded to the best blue-ribbon winner scoring 95 or above from Foliage, Flowering and Fruiting

Branches (Section 2, Classes 43-76). All specimens must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The Award is \$7.50 and a Rosette of two shades of Green Ribbons.

Award of Horticultural Excellence

Awarded to the blue-ribbon winner scoring 95 or above, and judged the finest entry in the entire Horticulture Division. All specimens must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The award is \$7.50 and a Rosette of Green, Orange and Blue Ribbons.

Award of Merit

May be awarded to a blue-ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in the designated Sections. An Award of Merit will be offered in each of the following categories: Roses, Annuals, Perennials and Herbs (Section 1, Classes 1-53; Section 2, Classes 1-9). All specimens must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The award is \$7.50 and an Orange Rosette.

Collector's Showcase

May be awarded to the blue-ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in Collections, Section 3, Classes 1-6. All specimens must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The award is \$7.50 and a Rosette of Brown and Green Ribbons.

Grower's Choice Award

Two may be awarded to blue ribbon winners scoring 95 or above in Flowering Container Plants or Baskets (Section 4, Classes 1-20), and Foliage Container Plants or Baskets (Section 5, Classes 1-47). All specimens must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The award is \$7.50 and a Dark Green Rosette.

ADDITIONAL AWARDS

Sweepstakes

Awarded to the horticulturist with the most blue ribbons in HORTICULTURE. The award is \$7.50 and a Rosette of Green and White Ribbons.

Azalea Garden Club

Awarded to the winner of the Arboreal Award, this award is a tray that will be engraved with the name of the winner and displayed at the Alice Boyle Garden Center

SECTION 1—DESIGN

- Design entries will be accepted on Monday, October 18th, 2021 from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm and on Tuesday, October 19th, 2021 until 10:00 am.
- Fresh plant material may not be treated. Some plant material must be used in the design. No artificial flowers, foliage, fruit or vegetables are permitted.
- Each exhibitor is allowed one entry per class. All classes are limited to a total of four (4) entries. A 3”x 5” index card placed on the underlay or pedestal top will list plant material used and may also be used to give designer’s interpretation.
- Accessories and featured objects may be used when tasteful and to add interest. If used, religious symbols must be displayed in a respectful manner and in accordance with local church policy.
- Use of taxidermy or national flags is not permitted.
- Designs are judged according to the Principles and Elements of Design.
- Exhibitor must find a substitute if unable to keep the reserved space.
- All designs should be creative and interpretative.
- Judges are asked to leave comments on all designs
- Exhibitors must check plant material in Designs on Thursday and replace if necessary.
- The following are not allowed: living plants with roots attached, container plants in soil, landscape scenes or special lighting.

DESIGNER'S CHOICE Eligible for Designer's Choice Award

The Designer has complete freedom in choice of components but must include some plant material in the design. The Designer may use fresh, dried or a combination of dried and fresh material. Dried material may be painted.

Class 1 *Mary McLeod Bethune, Educator (Mayesville, 1875-1955)*

Transparency design (p. 77: a Creative Design with see-through elements [translucent, diaphanous, grid-like materials, etc.] integral to the design and permitting some components to be viewed through others)

To be displayed on a table with a staging panel 32" wide and 40" high and an underlay 32" wide and 30" deep.

Class 2 *Ann Pamela Cunningham, Mount Vernon Ladies' Association (Laurens County, 1816-1886)*

Reflective design (p. 75: a Creative Design containing reflective materials giving back images of light to the viewer)

To be displayed on a table with a staging panel 32" wide and 40" high and an underlay 32" wide and 30" deep.

Class 3 *Mary Boykin Chestnut, Diarist (Stateburg, 1823-1886)*

Cascade design (p. 73: a Creative Design with an emphasis on downward rhythmic movement)

To be displayed on a table with a staging panel 32" wide and 40" high and an underlay 32" wide and 30" deep.

PETITE

Eligible for Petite Award

Designs will be judged from the front. Underlay and background may be furnished by the designer.

Class 4 *Peggy Parrish, Author of "Amelia Bedelia" series of children's books (Manning, 1927-1988)*

Grouped Mass design in a teacup (p.78: a Creative Design of only plant material with a radial placement)

Dimensions of design must not exceed 8 inches in all directions.

To be displayed on a black draped pedestal in an area 10" x 10". Staging panels and underlays may be furnished by the designer.

Class 5 *Caroline Etheredge Hembel, Pioneer Aviator (Saluda, 1918-2001)*

Hanging design (p.74: a Creative Design organized as a single unit suspended on an ornament hanger provided by the Show committee)

Dimensions of design must not exceed 5 inches in all directions.

To be displayed on a painted black pedestal in an area 10" x 10". Staging panels and underlays may be furnished by the designer.

Class 6 *Elizabeth White, Artist (Sumter, 1883-1976)*

Angular design (p. 73: a Creative Design emphasizing strong angles that may be acute, obtuse, reflex, right angles or combination of angles)

Dimensions of design must not exceed 8 inches in all directions.

To be displayed on a black draped pedestal in an area 10" x 10". Staging panels and underlays may be furnished by the designer.

YOUTH

- All Youth Designs are eligible for the **Youth Top Exhibitor Award**.
- Youth designers may choose fresh or dried plant material or a combination of both.
- Design will be staged on a table within an area 32" by 30".
- Youth Designs are judged using the Scale of Points for Designs (see p.7)

EDUCATION

- Educational Exhibits must have educational value and are competitive.
- Each Educational Exhibit must occupy at least 18 square feet of surface area.
- Each exhibit will be staged on a 6’ table place against the wall with the title on the background.
- Education Exhibits must be the work of one individual.
- Handouts add to the quality of an exhibit but are not required.
- Some fresh plant material must be included in the exhibit.
- One Educational Exhibit scoring 95 or more is eligible for the **Educational Top Exhibitor Award**.

SECTIONS 2 – 5 HORTICULTURE

- Exhibitor may make more than one entry per class if each entry is a different species, variety, cultivar, type or color.
- Only entries for which a class is listed will be accepted.
- All cut horticulture must be fresh, groomed and grown by the exhibitor and in the possession of the exhibitor for at least ninety (90) days.
- Plants grown primarily for blooms must be blooming.
- The exhibitor must furnish clean containers: small clear bottles for small stems, large clear bottles for stalks, shrubs, sprays or branches.
- Cut specimens may be wedged with clear plastic wrap and must not exceed 30” in length. Foliage should not be below water line.
- No polishing of leaves is allowed.
- Correct scientific names are encouraged for all horticulture specimens exhibited in a Standard Flower Show and are required for exhibits to win a Top Exhibitor Award in Horticulture. Common names may be added but not substituted for a scientific name.
Note: the correct scientific name is required for all ivy specimens.
- Collections requirements: a group of 5 cut specimens of similar characteristics in separate containers but staged as a whole. Approximately 20 inches of space will be allowed for each collection.
