GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

This is an NGC Standard Flower Show conforming to the standards of the *Handbook for Flower Shows, Revised 2017, with revisions printed in the National Gardener*. The digital version of the handbook can be found on the NGC website (<https://gardenclub.org/flower-show-school-resources>).

- The Schedule is the law of the Show.
- All entries will be received at the Memorial Building on Monday, October 17, 2022, from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm.
- All exhibits must be removed on Sunday, October 23, 2022 After 4:00 pm. Prize money will be available in the Fair office.
- Registration is required for all entries. Application forms can be obtained from the Fair Office or from the Fair website (www.sumterfair.com). The registration deadline is Noon, Thursday, October 13, 2022.
- Judging will take place at 1:00 pm on Tuesday, October 18, 2022. The decision of the judges is final. Awards may be withheld if not merited. Only required personnel will be allowed in the Exhibition Hall during judging. In addition to Judges and Clerks, the presence of the following personnel is required during judging: Superintendent, Flower Show Consultant, Clerks Chairman and Horticulture/Classification Chairman. Photographers may take pictures before or after judging but not during judging.
- Plant material on the **South Carolina Adopted Conservation List** (p.17) and the list of **South Carolina Invasive Plants Banned from NGC Flower Shows** (p.18) may not be used. No artificial plant material is allowed in any division.
- The show is open to any amateur gardener in Sumter, Lee, Clarendon and Kershaw Counties.
- The Fair Management and Flower Show Chairmen will exercise the utmost care in the protection of all exhibits but will not be responsible for loss or damage.

AWARDS and RIBBONS

1 Blue Ribbon (First Place).....90+

1 Red Ribbon (Second Place).....85+

1 Yellow Ribbon (Third Place).....80+

1 or more White Ribbons (Honorable Mention).....75+

National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC) Top Award ribbons may be given to Blue Ribbon Winners in designated classes which meet the following requirements: Horticulture, Design, Educational Exhibits and Youth winners must have been awarded blue ribbons, scoring at least 95 points or higher, and must have met other specific requirements of the Top Award Ribbon offered as stated in *Handbook for Flower Shows, REVISED 2017*. For the digital version of the handbook, see : <https://gardenclub.org/flower-show-school-resources>. The correct botanical name is required for a Top Award Ribbon in Horticulture.

SECTION 1

DESIGN

Tricolor Award

One may be awarded to the blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in TRICOLOR, Classes 1, 2 and 3. The award is \$10 and a Rosette of blue, red and yellow ribbons.

Designer's Choice Award

One may be awarded to the blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in DESIGNER'S CHOICE, Classes 4, 5 and 6. The Award is \$10 and a Rosette of three Purple Ribbons.

EDUCATION

Educational Top Exhibitor Award

One may be awarded to the blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in EDUCATION, Exhibits 7 and 8. The award is \$10 and a Rosette of Brown and White Ribbons.

YOUTH

Youth Top Exhibitor Award

One may be awarded to the blue ribbon winner scoring 90 or above in YOUTH, Classes 9, 10 and 11. The Award is \$10 and a Rosette of Red, White and Blue Ribbons.

SECTIONS 2 -5
HORTICULTURE
Arboreal Award

One may be awarded to the best blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above from Foliage, Flowering and Fruiting Branches (Section 3, Classes 39-62). All specimens must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The Award is \$7.50 and a Rosette of two shades of Green Ribbons.

Award of Horticultural Excellence

One may be awarded to the blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above, and judged the finest entry in the entire Horticulture Division. Specimen must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The award is \$7.50 and a Rosette of Green, Orange and Blue Ribbons.

Award of Merit

Four may be awarded to blue ribbon winners scoring 95 or above in the designated Sections. An Award of Merit will be offered in each of the following categories: Roses, Annuals, Perennials and Herbs (Section 2, Classes 1-47; Section 3, Classes 1-10). All specimens must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The award is \$7.50 and an Orange Rosette.

Collector's Showcase

One may be awarded to the blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in Collections, Section 4, Classes 1-4. All specimens must be labeled in order with the proper botanical name. The award is \$7.50 and a Rosette of Brown and Green Ribbons.

Grower's Choice Award

Two may be awarded to blue ribbon winners scoring 95 or above in Container-Grown Plants for Bloom or Hanging Baskets for Bloom (Section 5, Classes 1-13), and Container-Grown Plants for Foliage or Hanging Baskets for Foliage (Section 5, Classes 14-59). All specimens must be labeled with the proper botanical name. The award is \$7.50 and a Dark Green Rosette.

ADDITIONAL AWARDS

Sweepstakes

One may be awarded to the horticulturist with the most blue ribbons in HORTICULTURE. The award is \$7.50 and a Rosette of Green and White Ribbons.

Azalea Garden Club

Awarded to the winner of the Arboreal Award, this award is a tray that will be engraved with the name of the winner and displayed at the Alice Boyle Garden Center.

SECTION 1—DESIGN RULES

- Design entries will be accepted on Monday, October 17, 2022 from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm and on Tuesday, October 19, 2021 until 10:00 am.
- Designs must be registered with the Reservation Chairman (see page 3) in addition to registration with the Fair.
- Design must not have previously been entered or judged in an NGC Flower Show.
- Staging panel and underlay are furnished by the designer.
- Fresh plant material may not be treated. Some plant material must be used in the design. No artificial flowers, foliage, fruit or vegetables are permitted.
- Each exhibitor is allowed one entry per class. All classes are limited to a total of four (4) entries. A 3”x 5” index card placed on the underlay or pedestal top will list plant material used and may also be used to give designer’s interpretation.
- Accessories and featured objects may be used when tasteful and to add interest. If used, religious symbols must be displayed in a respectful manner and in accordance with local church policy.
- Use of taxidermy or national flags is not permitted.
- Designs are judged according to the Principles and Elements of Design.
- Exhibitor must find a substitute if unable to fill the reserved space.
- All designs should be creative and interpretative.
- Judges are asked to leave comments on all designs.
- Exhibitors must check plant material in Designs on Thursday and replace if necessary.
- The following are not allowed: living plants with roots attached, container plants in soil, landscape scenes or special lighting.
- Designs not placed on pedestals will be placed on a white tabletop covered with exhibitor’s staging panel and underlay.

TRICOLOR

Eligible for Tricolor Award

All plant material must be fresh.

Class 1 *Appaloosa*

Grouped Mass design (p. 78: a mass design of only plant material with radial placement)
To be displayed on a table with a staging panel 32" wide with height determined by the designer and an underlay 32" wide and 30" deep.

Class 2 *Labrador Retriever*

Spatial Thrust design (p. 75: a Creative Design consisting of two (2) parallel placements of similar components)
To be displayed on a table with a staging panel 32" wide with height determined by the designer and an underlay 32" wide and 30" deep.

Class 3 *Poodle*

Reflective design (p. 75: a Creative Design containing reflective materials giving back images of light to the viewer)
To be displayed on a table with a staging panel 32" wide with height determined by the designer and an underlay 32" wide and 30" deep.

DESIGNER'S CHOICE

Eligible for Designer's Choice Award

Plant material may be all fresh, all dried or a combination of both.

Class 4 *Black-Tongued Puppy*

Parallel design (p.75: a design consisting of three (3) or more groupings of plant material and optional components with a strong parallel placement in a single container and/or base)
Design must contain the color black.
To be displayed on a table with a staging panel 32" wide with height determined by the designer and an underlay 32" wide and 30" deep.

Class 5 *Calico Cat*

Multi-Rhythmic design (p.75: a Creative Design with emphasis on two (2) or more rhythms in the design with one (1) dominating)
Design must contain 3 colors, like a Calico cat.
To be displayed on a table with a staging panel 32" wide with height determined by the designer and an underlay 32" wide and 30" deep.

Class 6 *Walking Horse*

Creative Line design (p. 74: a Creative Design where line is dominant with a minimum of plant material and other components)

To be displayed on a black draped pedestal in an area 10" x 10". Staging panels and underlays may be furnished by the designer. To be viewed from all sides.

EDUCATION

- Educational Exhibits must have educational value and are competitive.
- Each Educational Exhibit must occupy at least 18 square feet of surface area.
- Each exhibit will be staged on a 6' table place against the wall with the title on the background.
- Education Exhibits must be the work of one individual.
- Handouts add to the quality of an exhibit but are not required.
- Some fresh plant material must be included in the exhibit.
- One Educational Exhibit scoring 95 or more is eligible for the **Educational Top Exhibitor Award**.

YOUTH

- All Youth Designs are eligible for the **Youth Top Exhibitor Award**.
- Youth designers may choose fresh or dried plant material or a combination of both.
- Design will be staged on a white tabletop within an area 32" by 30".
- Youth Designs are judged using the Scale of Points for Designs (see p.7)
- NGC exhibit policies are printed in ***Handbook for Flower Shows, REVISED 2017, Chapter 9.***

SECTIONS 2 – 5 HORTICULTURE RULES

- Exhibitor may make more than one entry per class if each entry is a different species, variety, cultivar, type or color.
- Only entries for which a class is listed will be accepted.
- NGC exhibit policies are printed in *Handbook for Flower Shows, REVISED 2017, Chapter 6*.
- All cut horticulture must be fresh, groomed and grown by the exhibitor and in the possession of the exhibitor for at least ninety (90) days.
- Plants grown primarily for blooms must be blooming.
- The exhibitor must furnish clean containers: small clear bottles for small stems, large clear bottles for stalks, shrubs, sprays or branches.
- Cut specimens may be wedged with clear plastic wrap and must not exceed 30” in length. Foliage should not be below water line.
- No polishing of leaves is allowed.
- Correct scientific names are encouraged for all horticulture specimens exhibited in a Standard Flower Show and are required for exhibits to win a Top Exhibitor Award in Horticulture. Common names may be added but not substituted for a scientific name.
Note: the correct scientific name is required for all ivy specimens.
- Collections requirements: a group of 5 cut specimens of similar characteristics in separate containers but staged as a whole. Approximately 20 inches of space will be allowed for each collection.
- Double potting is allowed.
