Mayfield Immigrant Bill For Families Now Law

WAUKEGAN, Ill. – A new law spearheaded by state Rep. Rita Mayfield, D-Waukegan, will prohibit local governments from signing contracts with the federal government to detain immigrants and will institute protections for immigrants to ensure law enforcement personnel and resources are not being deputized by the federal government for immigration enforcement.

“Local sheriffs and police should be focused on their community, not engaging in work for federal immigration authorities,” Mayfield said. “I am proud to see Illinois take another step in becoming a state that treats immigrants as people and rejects the costly and inhumane detention apparatus operated by ICE.”

The Mayfield-backed Senate Bill 667 builds on the TRUST and VOICES Acts to protect immigrant families by prohibiting state and local law enforcement from inquiring about or inves-

tigating the citizenship or immigration status of an individual in police custody. The bill also prevents state and local law enforcement from entering into or renewing agreements to house people charged with federal immigration violations. Additionally, the new law empowers the Attorney General to conduct investigations into violations of the state’s guidelines related to immigration.

Mayfield served as one of the lead sponsors of the legislation, which was signed into law by Gov. J.B. Pritzker this month.

“Too often in recent years we have seen politicians inflict hardship and suffering amongst immigrant families to score cheap political points,” Mayfield said. “Illinois is stronger because of its immigrant population, and I am grateful for the continued work from advocates to ensure we are creating communities that respect all residents regardless of background.”

Booster Shots Now Available for Covid-19

The CDC, September 23, 2021 approved third Pfizer doses (boosters) for select adults six months following their second Pfizer vaccination. The approval paves the way for boosters for the following groups:

- People 65 years and older and residents in long-term care settings
- People aged 18–64 years with underlying medical conditions
- People aged 18–64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting
- Frontline workers

For now, CDC approval is limited only to these select groups and applies only to those within these groups who originally received Pfizer brand vaccine. The need for boosters for individuals who originally received Moderna and J&J is still under review.

Waukegan art workshops to connect CLC to community arts

Waukegan is a city with a rich history of the arts, and College of Lake County (CLC) is building its partnership with the community to promote and further that history through a pair of accessible workshops at the Lakeshore campus.

Waukegan has been home to numerous successful artists in a variety of mediums throughout its history. While walking around downtown, it's hard to go without seeing visual art, whether it be statues or murals painted onto buildings. The city is also home to multiple art galleries and theatres that host live theatre and dance performances.

Since 2011, in an attempt to help revitalize the city and art culture, ArtWauk takes place once a month in downtown Waukegan as a way for artists to share their work, as well as a chance to show off classic pieces.

Katrina Davis-Salazar, a successful mixed media artist and art instructor at CLC, and CLC's new Community Art and Engagement Coordinator, hopes CLC can help the city's effort of bringing out new and diverse voices in the city and surrounding communities by providing people with an opportunity and materials.

Each of the two different workshops will have two sections in the Fall and two in the Spring. Engaging Art Scholars for Excellence (EASE) is a workshop designed for high school students.

"The purpose is to mentor and encourage youth so there are more working minority artists in our community in the future," Davis-Salazar said. "We also aim to introduce youth and their parents to the idea that a successful career and/or education in the arts is possible."

Davis-Salazar, who is a minority herself, said in many minority households, the standards are very high and sometimes the arts are not seen as a secure path to success. Early recruiting efforts for these workshops have been focused on areas with higher minority populations, including Waukegan, Zion and North Chicago.

"Our end goal is to have more diverse working artists so that in the future, curators can host exhibits inclusive of all cultures and races," Davis-Salazar said.

One way for CLC to aid in reaching this goal is to help provide accessible resources, support and opportunities in the community. Participants will be provided with pre-assembled art kits. Each kit includes inserts with instructions on how to post and tag the art they create at home on social media so they can be followed up with.

EASE isn't only aimed at students already interested in pursuing an education or career in the arts, but for anyone who wants to try it out.

"The teen years are an interesting stage of art development," Davis-Salazar said. "Students can have been drawing their entire lives or they can get to college, take an art class, and realize they're actually really good at it. I've witnessed it in my classes many times."

The EASE workshop schedule:

Workshop #1: STORIED (Stories, Rebus, Ex-votos and Text in Art), Thursday, Sept. 30, 5 to 8 p.m.. Workshop #2: Still Life with Skulls and Dolls, Thursday, Oct. 21, 5 to 8 p.m.

Artist to Artist (ATA), the second type of workshop, is designed for adults. The goal of ATA is to connect local artists with CLC, and then to connect one step further with the community.

In each workshop, a CLC instructor will pair up with a talented local artist to teach. This gives those who attend the workshops the opportunity to create connections with both CLC and someone in the community, as well as others around them. The art kits will also be handed out at the ATA workshops.

The ATA workshop schedule:

Workshop #1: Childhood Portraits with Everett Reynolds and Katrina Davis-Salazar, Thursday, Oct. 7, 6 to 9 p.m. ([register here](#))

Workshop #2: Figure Drawing with Michelle Patch and Hans Habberger Thursday, Nov. 18, 6 to 9 p.m. ([register here](#))

In the spring, after the workshops have concluded, a showcase event will take place in one of the numerous Waukegan galleries where the art created can be shown off to the community. The goal is to have the work shown for a month or two.

CLC is dedicated to offering community programming and expanding course offerings at all campuses for more inclusive access to all and to close opportunity gaps. "There is so much positive growth and change happening with the arts at both the Grayslake campus and Lakeshore campus," Davis-Salazar said.

While art classes have been limited at the Waukegan campus, the Communication Arts, Humanities and Fine Arts division is committed to offering more creative classes at the campus, starting in Spring 2022.

State Rep. Joyce Mason Secures Property Tax Relief and Decarbonization with Clean Energy Bill

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — With the passage of the 2021 clean energy bill, state Rep. Joyce Mason, D-Gurnee, successfully secured millions in property tax relief and grants for Zion, paved the way for new green jobs and set out a plan to reduce carbon emissions in Illinois.

"I'm grateful that we've found a legislative solution that will provide much needed property tax relief to the people and businesses of Zion," Mason said. "In addition, we are addressing the climate crisis, creating new opportunities for good-paying careers, expanding job training and putting Illinois on the path to be 100 percent renewable energy."

When the Zion Nuclear Power Station closed in 1998, the city lost 800 jobs and the tax income from the plant went from \$20 million to less than \$1 million annually. Additionally, due to nuclear waste, the city has been unable to develop the 257 acres of valuable lakefront land. Mason worked to ensure clean energy job legislation that passed the House this week includes a path for the state of Illinois to transition to 100% clean energy. This change will bring approximately \$15 million of additional income to the city annually.

Mason's vote for Senate Bill 2408 also takes concrete steps to protect our environment by requiring decarbonization over the coming years and setting the goal of Illinois transitioning to 100 percent renewable energy by 2050. The legislation also creates new training programs across the state to train people for green and foster new small businesses in renewable energy.

"This didn't get done without Representative Mason spearheading these



efforts," said Zion Mayor Billy McKinney. "She worked on this matter non-stop and showed us how much she cares and how much she will fight for the residents of her district. The efforts of Representative Yingling and the rest of the house delegation should be commended as well. Thank you, Joyce, Sam, the rest of the delegation on behalf of the people of Zion."

"The Zion community has been floundering alone, without a voice, for 23 years after the devastating impact the plant closure caused," said David Knabel, Zion City Administrator. Representative Mason jumped when she heard our pleas and gave us a voice. This is a turning point in the future of our community and could not have been done without her and her peers and we cannot thank them enough."

"This wouldn't have been possible without the support and efforts of City of Zion Mayor Billy McKinney and City Administrator David Knabel, as well as the members of the Lake County House Delegation, which includes Representatives Johnathan Carroll, Dan Didech, Rita Mayfield, Bob Morgan, and Sam Yingling," said Mason. "I'm especially grateful to Rep Yingling, who has worked very hard to help draft this legislation, sharing his experience and knowledge from his tenure in the legislature and his service as Chairperson of the Counties and Townships Committee and Sub Chair of the Property Tax Committee. I am so fortunate to work with an incredible group of people who were committed to making this happen."

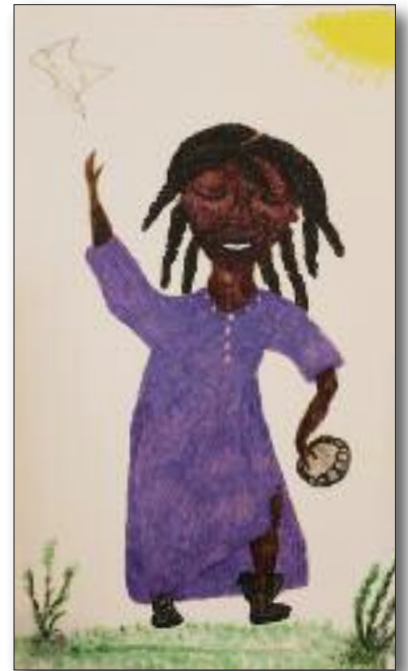
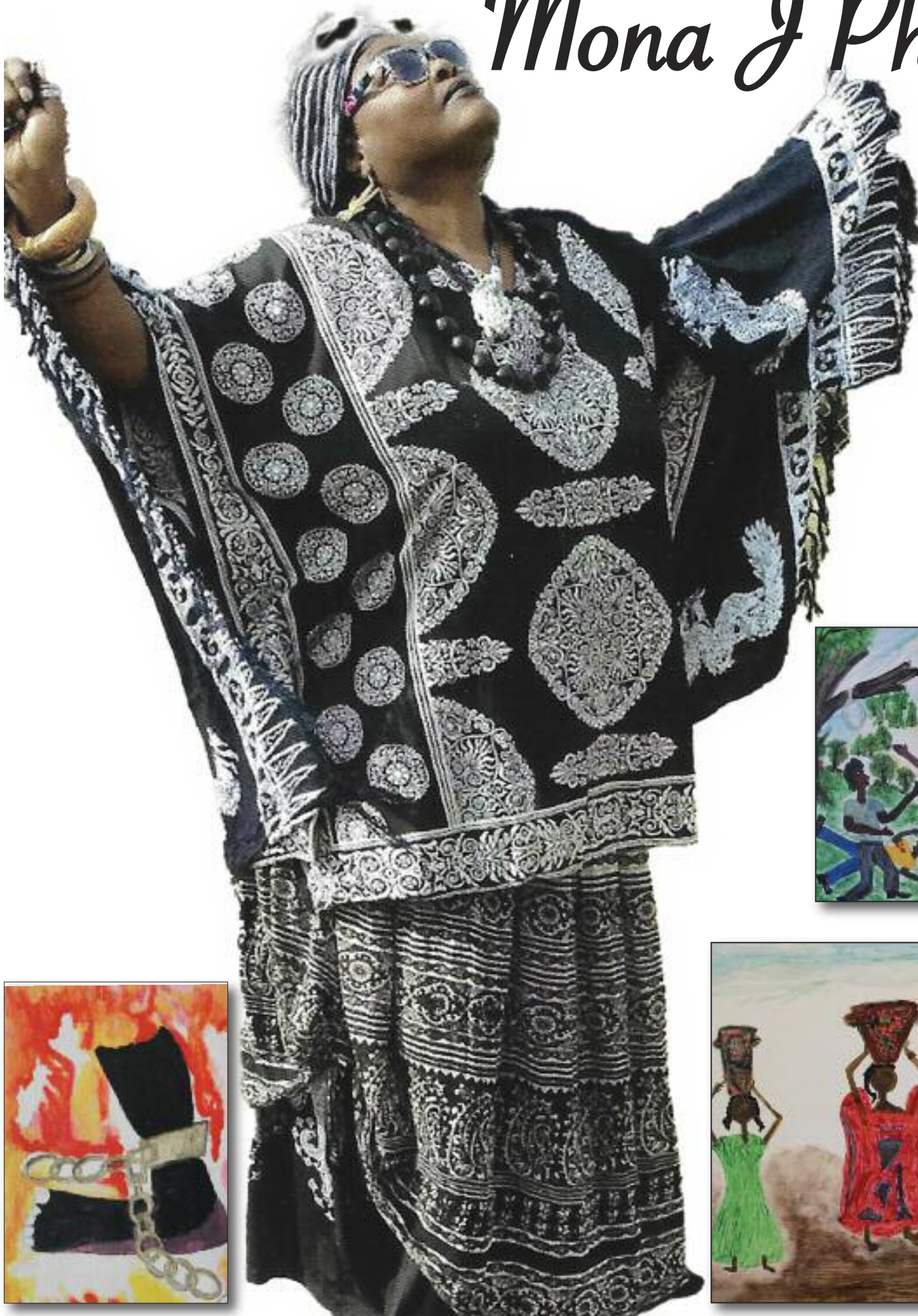

Juanita Phiffer, also known as Mona J Phiffer Art, is an exceptionally talented African American artist whose work is now on display at the Dandelion Art Gallery and Studio in Waukegan. Mona, as she is affectionately called, is a “Universe” conscience artist who uses her artwork to express deep concepts that are relevant to everyone.

“I am art, I project art on everything I see and everything that I touch,” says Mona Phiffer when asked to tell a little bit about herself. As a mother of 13, she is an enigma, and a woman on a mission, expressing visceral truths in simplistic yet complicated folk art that speaks to the soul.

Mona says that her first work of art was created a few years ago. She caught a glimpse of a little black boy eating a piece of watermelon.

“I was intrigued,” says Mona. “I painted the watermelon.”

That piece, depicting a cut watermelon with a slice is one of her signature works on display at the Gallery as well as other Afro-centric pieces that resonates with deeper stories yet to be told. For example, one of her most beautiful paintings is a self-portrait that she calls Mona. It is a depiction of herself as a child. But hidden in plain view is a Dove hovering

above her head. Mona says that the Dove represents the Angels that follow us around.

“The impressive volume of her work, when viewed all at once, tells a cohesive story. Phiffer’s work goes beyond simplistic, child-like, folk art with its heavily detailed, richly colored, and content-driven depictions demanding of attention,” writes The Chicago Tribune’s Dan Moran.

Born September 13, 1942, Fisher graduated from the North Chicago Community High School, and attended Kennedy King College in Chicago and the College of Lake County in Grayslake. She worked at several companies including Shore Printing Company, Lake Forest College, Baxter Healthcare and The Sherwood Group Management Association Company. She retired from Trustmark Insurance Company, Lake Forest, IL.

On July 26, 1969, Betty Jean Armstead and Ernest B. Fisher were joined in holy matrimony and became a loving combined family of five: Ernest Sr., Betty, Ernest Jr., Victor and Patrice.

Betty was a member of the Trinity African Methodist Episcopal Church in Waukegan where she served in many capacities including Stewart Trustee and Church Treasurer.

Betty also received a Certificate of Completion from the North Chicago Police Department Citizens Police Academy.

Betty's sweet treats always made from scratch were like no others. Her sweet treats were always delicious. It's a mystery as to when she found time to make her sugar cookies, pralines, pound cakes and that mouth watering peach cobbler! No matter what the occasion, everyone looked forward to one of Betty's desserts.
