Lake County Vaccination Updates

The Lake County Health Department is celebrating its partnership with 45 Lake County public school districts to vaccinate over 12,500 private and public education staff and childcare workers in just two months.

In early February, Adlai E. Stevenson High School and Round Lake High School opened vaccination sites for public and private Pre-K through 12th grade staff, which later opened to group childcare workers. Over 17,000 COVID-19 vaccine doses have been administered at the school vaccination sites so far.

After Friday, April 2, 2021, the two schools will temporarily pause vaccination efforts. However, they may reopen once vaccines are approved for school-age children, which may occur as early as the summer or fall of this year.

“Vaccinating Lake County’s public and private school education staff and childcare work-

ers has been a priority of our department because of the exposure risks in these settings and the heavy burdens that working families have had to carry throughout this pandemic,” said Mark Pfister, Executive Director at the Lake County Health Department. “We are extremely grateful to the leadership of Adlai E. Stevenson High School and Round Lake High School for their continued partnership, stepping up to the plate to help us vaccinate thousands of Pre-K through 12th grade staff and childcare workers in Lake County.”

By the final date of operations on April 2, it is expected that 25,000 doses will have been administered between the two schools. Both schools have generously offered the equipment from their vaccination sites to be used at other Lake County vaccination sites during the pause.

“We are grateful to have had the opportunity to make Round Lake High School available for school districts and other areas of the county to receive their vaccine; playing a small part in the monumental process of getting through this pandemic,” said Donn Mendoza, Ed.D., Superintendent of Schools for District 116. “This takes us another step closer to making in-person learning available to children across the county.”

Pre-K through 12th Grade school teachers, staff, and group childcare workers (in facilities with DCFS license or DCFS license-exempt documentation*) who live or work in Lake County and have not yet been vaccinated should sign up on the AllVax system, <https://AllVax.lakecohealth.org>, following these instructions:

Second dose appointments for educators will be offered at the Lake County Fairgrounds starting April 3, 2021.

“We are deeply grateful to the Lake County Health Department for their steady leadership during this unprecedented time, especially as they continue with the herculean task of vaccinating all of Lake County,” said Dr. Eric Twadell, Superintendent of District 125 - Stevenson High School. “Our partnership with them has been integral to our work on safely

bringing students, faculty and staff back to campuses around Lake County as soon as possible. We are proud to be able to contribute to this effort by serving as a vaccination site for educators and look forward to seeing normalcy restored in our community soon.”

Additional Information

As of March 17, 2021, over 212,687 doses of the COVID-19 vaccine have been administered to Lake County residents. At least 76,323 Lake County residents, or 10.89% of the county’s population, are fully vaccinated. Over 91,218 doses have been administered among residents ages 65 and older and over 60% of Lake County seniors have received at least one dose. Lake County is averaging 5,264 doses administered daily on a 7-day rolling average.

Lake County and partners continue to vaccinate those eligible in Phase 1b, including seniors age 65 and older and frontline essential workers, as well as remaining residents eligible in Phase 1a such as healthcare workers and residents of long-term care facilities and other congregate settings. Pharmacies and other providers which receive their vaccine supply from the state or federal government are also vaccinating people eligible in Phase 1b plus, which includes those age 16-64 with high risk medical conditions and those with disabilities.

While vaccine supply continues to be limited across the United States and the world, the Lake County Health Department encourages residents to explore their options for COVID-19 vaccination and take the first available appointment when eligible. There are four ways to access the vaccine:

Registering in AllVax by visiting <https://AllVax.lakecohealth.org> or calling (847) 377-8130. Those who register will be notified when an appointment is available at a Lake County Health Department vaccination site. You may also call the new Illinois Vaccine Appointment Call Center at (833) 621-1284, which is open 7 days a week from 6 a.m. to midnight.

4 Ways Black Women Can Prioritize Self-Care for Improved Heart Health



(StatePoint) High blood pressure -- the leading risk factor for heart attack and stroke -- continues to disproportionately affect communities of color. Addressing this health inequity is especially important right now, as people with hypertension and serious heart conditions are at an increased risk for more severe outcomes if they acquire COVID-19.

According to the American Heart Association, the prevalence of high blood pressure among Black adults in the U.S. is among the highest in the world, with the prevalence of high blood pressure in Black women nearly 40 percent higher than white women in the U.S.

While many long-standing inequities and stressors produced by structural racism have created and continue to exacerbate these conditions, there are steps individuals can take to prioritize self-care for improved blood pressure.

This is why the American Medical Association (AMA), the AMA Foundation, Association of Black Cardiologists, American Heart Association, Minority Health Institute and National Medical Association have launched the "Release the Pressure" campaign with ESSENCE. The campaign is aimed at part-

nering with Black women to help improve their heart health and be part of a movement for healthy blood pressure, with a shared goal of engaging more than 300,000 Black women.

As part of the campaign, the AMA and this coalition of national health care organizations encourages Black women to take a pledge to be part of a healthy blood pressure movement at [ReleaseThePressure.org](https://www.releasepressure.org). Specifically, the pledge encourages Black women to take the following four steps:

1. Set a blood pressure goal: Schedule an appointment with your physician or other health care professional, in-person or virtually, to work in partnership on understanding your blood pressure numbers and knowing your goal for optimal blood pressure.
2. Monitor blood pressure numbers at home: Once you learn your blood pressure numbers, take and keep regular records of your blood pressure.
3. Activate a personalized wellness plan: Identify specific goals for fitness and heart healthy eating and connect virtually with family members and friends from your "squad" to keep you on track.
4. Make regular check-ins with your "squad": Lean on your family and friends to help you achieve your heart health goals by checking in with them on a daily basis.

"Preventive care is vital to breaking the devastating impact of high blood pressure within the Black community, particularly during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic," says Patrice A. Harris, M.D., MA, president of the AMA. "It starts with understanding blood pressure numbers and taking action to manage blood pressure."

LeBron James Now Co-Owner of the Boston Red Sox

The rivalry between NY and Boston goes back decades and there's no way you can support both teams ... even if you're LeBron! LeBron's business partner, Maverick Carter, is also part of the FSG ownership group now -- which makes him a Sox part-owner as well. LeBron has yet to publicly comment on the deal -- but he's expected to make some sort of announcement in the near future. FYI, the Boston Red Sox are reportedly valued at \$3.3 BILLION, according to Forbes... which makes them the 3rd most valuable franchise in MLB, behind the Yankees and Dodgers.

LeBron has some experience with pro sports ownership -- he bought

a piece of the legendary Liverpool soccer team back in 2011. As for FSG, the company owns pieces of the NESN Network, Roush Fenway Racing, Liverpool FC, and more. The move expands LeBron's already impressive empire -- he's reportedly made \$343 million from NBA contracts alone. Plus, his media company, Springhill Entertainment, is thriving with Space Jam 2 coming out soon.

And, don't forget that reportedly \$1 billion lifetime deal with Nike. He's also a part-owner of the Blaze pizza company and has a stake in the Ladder supplement company, which he created with Arnold Schwarzenegger. The bottom line ... LeBron is not only the greatest athlete on the planet, he's a pretty savvy businessman, too!

Easing Students' Anxieties as They Return to the Classroom

(StatePoint) When it comes to the emotional well-being of students post-pandemic, a new study reveals that teachers expect significant challenges when schools make a full return to in-person learning.

The study, commissioned by the Crisis Prevention Institute (CPI), the world leader in de-escalation training, shows that 84% of teachers say student trauma, mental health issues and increased anxiety are their biggest concerns with full classroom re-entry.

"Many of those in school communities have faced adversity and trauma, ranging from upended routines to home isolation and loss of family members. Simply restarting school won't erase the aftereffects," says Susan Driscoll, president of CPI.

- **Create a good learning environment:** Classrooms should be well-organized and structured, but also welcom-

ing to reestablish a familiar routine.

- **Listen empathetically:** Offer your undivided attention, then provide thoughtful, non-judgmental feedback.

- **Rebuild trust:** In a recent survey by the American Federation of Teachers and the New York Life Foundation, only 15% of educators said they feel very comfortable addressing students' emotional needs caused or intensified by the coronavirus outbreak. While teachers may feel a bit unprepared in this area, making it clear to students that sharing their feelings and concerns is appreciated and encouraged will go a long way.

- **Acknowledge your own anxiety:** Take the time to understand the reasons you are feeling anxious and seek a positive outlet.

Opening the doors is only step one in returning students to the classroom. As the pandemic eases, parents and teachers will also need to actively address a year's worth of isolation and anxiety.



Emerging Leadership in Zion,

Richard Frierson

A native of Lake County and a graduate of Waukegan High School, Richard Frierson is a dedicated husband and father of two adult children and an active civic leader in the northern suburbs of Chicagoland. He is currently serving as the Public Health and Safety Commissioner for the City of Zion, President of the Zion-Benton Coalition for Healthy Communities and he is a full-time Software Engineer at a Fortune 500 firm, Grainger.

Frierson, a resident of Zion since 2004, is very active in the community. He began with Grainger as a Customer Service Representative and received training and promotions over the course of years landing him in the position of Software Engineer. His professional growth was also paired with his civic engagement.

He completed the activities associated with the Zion-Benton Leadership Academy in 2015 and then became the Curriculum Chair and Program Facilitator for that organization until 2019 when he became Chairman of the Wellness Task force and was recently elected President of the organization.

Frierson explains that the Coalition of Healthy Communities has far reaching impact for area residents. They have sponsored health and wellness fairs in partnership with Rosalind Franklin University with several programs that have benefited Seniors and High School Students. The Coalition sponsors the leadership academy which has two divisions, one for youth and another for adults. Several of the adults have gone on to obtain elected positions. Frierson is careful to say that the organization is not political, but encourages individuals to be civic minded.

In 2015, he was appointed to the City of Zion Board of Commissioners, and served two years. Currently he is serving



as Commissioner of Police and Fire and Rescue. For his civic leadership, Frierson was presented the Key to the City by Mayor Al Hill in 2017.

“Zion is a little bit different,” says Frierson when asked about his responsibilities as a City Commissioner.

“Zion is not your typical Mayor / Alderman structured city, it serves as a Commissioner form of government and is split among five divisions. I am the commissioner for Public Health and Safety which includes the Police and Fire and Rescue departments. My responsibilities include budget and policy and making sure we hold those departments to the charge and responsibilities of those departments,” Frierson said.

Frierson also explains that in his role as a commissioner, he handles escalation of problems and union negotiations as well as other issues as they arise.

When asked about long-term aspirations for Zion, Frierson said that he longs for, “a healthy thriving community, one where people can grow”.

Specifically, Frierson said that he would like to see downtown “beefed-up” with places where people can go to eat and experience fine dining.

Richard is a lifelong learner and enjoys reading, trading markets, financial coaching, bicycling, traveling, and spending time with family.

Pritzker's \$4 Mil for At-Risk Youth

Governor JB Pritzker announced investments to the Youth Career Pathways program that will expand training for Illinois youth who face barriers to education, training, and employment. Through a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) released by the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO), Illinois will expand access to training and support services for youth ages 16-24.

Applications for the NOFO are due on April 1, at 5:00 p.m. To apply, please visit DCEO's website. "With an expansion of our youth training programs, not only will we prepare more of Illinois' youth for jobs, but we will ensure they are ready to hit the ground running for the careers of the future," said Gov. Pritzker. "An investment in our youth is an investment in the future of Illinois."

"As a former youth outreach worker, I know how important investments to expand youth training will be in helping to remove barriers for youth seeking well-paying careers as well as building a pipeline of well-trained talent for employers," said Director Sylvia Garcia. "This is an important investment in our next

The Community Action Partnership announced that \$1,500 scholarships are available to qualified students pursuing Higher Education through their CSBG Scholarship program.

Applicants must be at least a high school senior and enrolled or planning to attend an Illinois accredited higher educational institution or occupational training.

There are some income eligibility criteria, and the student must live in Lake County. Applicants are required to submit a letter of recommendation from someone within the community, and a 500 word essay, typed and double spaced, which includes the applicants most important life experience; what receiving this scholarship would mean, what community action means to the applicant, and what contribution applicant intends to make to the community.




