

Key Election Outcomes

It is a historic day in Lake County. The City of Waukegan has made history by electing their first African American Mayor, Sam Cunningham. Alderman Cunningham bested incumbent Mayor Wayne Motley in a hotly contested primary race then went on to win in the general election over independent, Lisa May by a few hundred votes.

In other key races, incumbent Mayor Leon Rockingham, Jr. recaptured the North Chicago Mayoral Seat for a third term. Aldermen Torrance Markham, Ernest Fischer, Kathy January and Carl Evans maintained their city council seats.

In Waukegan, Jeff McBride, a former long-term Waukegan Public School Board member, returned to District #60 as the top vote getter in a crowded race of individuals vying to garner a seat. Anita Hanna, Michael Rodriguez, and Brandon Ewing (a new comer to politics) also won in that

race.

Janet Killkelly won for City Clerk of Waukegan and she returned as a commissioner for the Waukegan Park District. Patricia Stephens bested a challenger by nearly three to one to join Margie Taylor, Ruth Davis, Michael Stewart, and Craig Bennett for the Zion Elementary School Board District #6.

Shawn White, Loren Karner, Gina Robert, Kathleen Richards, Kimberly Leech and Jerry Nordstrom won for the Zion Benton Township High School District #126.

Sonolito Bronson won the Benton Township Clerk's position and Arthur Craigen won for Waukegan Township Highway Commissioner.

Audrey Nixon

Longest Serving County Commissioner, Passes

A Peoples Voice Special Report

Audrey Nixon, 81, was the longest serving Lake County Commissioner serving the 14th District passed away at her home on April 27, 2017. According to authorities, no foul play was suspected. She was recovering from an illness.

Beginning in 1982, Nixon was elected as a Commissioner for the largely African American County District and is credited for bringing the Greenbelt Cultural Center to North Chicago. She also served as a board member of the Lake County Forest Preserve and is noted for heading several legislative committees of Lake County Government. Nixon served as a representative in the Democratic Party and cast one of the electoral college votes for President Barack Obama in his last election. In 2007, Audrey was named the Most Influential African American of Lake County.

In addition to her work as a County Board Member, Audrey Nixon was a long-time business owner and community supporter.

"Audrey was always supportive of the Lake County Black Chamber of Commerce," says Rev. Arthur Gass, Sr. the organization's president.

Gass gave an example of how just recently the Majority Contractor for the New Marion Jones Project said that they could not find minority vendors as subcontractors. The Contractor advertised out of the area and did not check with the Black Chamber of Commerce, or run ads in The Peoples Voice, What's Happening, or other newspapers that Black Contractors read. The Contractor said that they would extend the bid opportunity and advertise in local newspapers due to the advocacy and support of Audrey Nixon.

This is just one example of Audrey Nixon's life-long legacy of helping others.

"Audrey has always been a strong supporter of The People's Voice," says Elroy Reed, President and CEO. "She was almost always present at North Chicago City Hall meetings, and was a great civic leader.

She was down to earth and approachable. She had a powerful voice as a commissioner on the County Board."

"I admired Audrey Nixon for having an open door and for setting an example as a person of excellence," says William McNeely, Chairman of the Board of the Community Action Partnership.

Nixon was a member of Christian Valley Missionary Baptist Church where she sang in the Choir. She also was an Eastern Star. She is survived by three adult children and 20 grandchildren.

Under the direction of Leatrice Williams, the Foundations Teacher at Zion Central Middle School, about 30 students and 13 Chaperones took a 8-Days / 7-Nights Trip to Washington D.C., New York and Philadelphia. I went along for the ride, and I served as a Chaperone. This was my first time riding a bus with so many school-aged young adults since I was in college. It brought back memories.

The trip was full of informative tours at museums, live shows, exotic foods, excitement, adventure, and yes, even intrigue.

The excursion began with an eight o'clock pm departure from Zion. We left from the City's only middle school under the cloak of darkness in a well-outfitted touring bus. The nocturnal chauffeurs drove through the night while most of the anticipating students and chaperones slept. I awoke as the bus spiraled through the Allegheny Mountains of West Virginia. The orange sun rose in the east amidst a stream of thin clouds and burgeoning mountainous ridges. It was picturesque, even breath-taking.

We arrived in Washington D.C. after stopping for breakfast at a popular Oasis known as the Gateway. From there we began a world-wind tour of the District of Columbia. The first stop was the Newseum. I did not know about this one. It is a gallery of historic news related articles, reporting, and historic fact collections as reported by media. For instance, on display was the famous headline of the Chicago Daily Tribune article which read "DEWEY Defeats Truman". The article had to be retracted for as we know, Truman won for Presidency that year. Dewey never made it.

A step by step report of all that was done and seen in the District of Co-

lumbia, New York, and Philadelphia would be more than bountiful than this story and space can deliver so we will keep with the highlights.

In Washington, we visited the Arlington Cemetery, and had lunch at Howard University. We took pictures in front of the White House, saw the tail end of President Trump's motorcade, went to several museums including the Smithsonian, toured the Library of Congress, went to the Lincoln Memorial, took photos in front of the Martin Luther King Jr. Statue, and enjoyed a dinner cruise of the Potomac River aboard the Spirit of Mt. Vernon Cruise Ship. At the Spy Museum, we were engaged in a high-level plot to smuggle a nuclear device and had to act as spies in an attempt to preempt a terrorist attack. The real-life espionage was a simulation of real-life events. It was engaging, full of excitement, including a rocky getaway where we were almost caught. As a spy, my code name was Donald Trump....intriguing.

In New York, we visited the new One World Trade Center. The 94-story building was so tall that we could not see the top of it from standing on the ground. It is the tallest building in the Western Hemisphere. We toured the United Nations building and saw real diplomats from some of the 193 member nations of this peace keeping institution.

We toured Madison Square Garden, and the Radio City Music Hall. At the Radio City Music Hall, we took a photo with one of the Radio City Music Hall Rockets. We went by the United States Treasury, walked down Wall Street, and shopped for souvenirs in New York's historic Times Square. We also saw a live Broadway Play, "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory". It was outstanding.



In Harlem, we toured a civil rights museum, saw a commercial being shot on a historic basketball court, ate at the historic Amy Ruth's Soul Food Restaurant, and attended Amateur Night at the Apollo. Amateur Night at the Apollo was fascinating and entertaining. I rooted for a regal African American female singer who performed a Phyllis Hyman number in a black and yellow outfit. She won the adult competition.

I can't forget to mention that we took a ferry to Ellis Island and to the Statue of Liberty.

On the last leg of the world-wind tour, we went to the City of Brotherly Love, Philadelphia. In Philadelphia, we spent time at the Franklin Institute and took part

Bishop E. James Logan Celebrates 20th Anniversary Christian Faith Fellowship Church of Zion

May 7th and the 12th , 2017, The Christian Faith Fellowship Church of Zion will celebrate their 20th Year as a Church and their Senior Pastor, Bishop E. James Logan will celebrate his 24th Year in the Ministry. The People's Voice asked Bishop Logan and his staff a number of questions about the church and why they consider themselves "The Church of the Acts". Here is what we discovered.

Q: Bishop, what has been your greatest achievement over the course of your 20 years as Pastor of Christian Faith Fellowship Church of Zion?

A: Bishop Logan says, "The greatest achievement is the salvation of hundreds if not thousands of souls".

From a historical perspective, Christian Faith Fellowship Church (CFFC) began in the heart of, then Evangelist, Darrell L. Hines. According to Bishop Logan, God showed Bishop Hines a vision of a church that was filled with people from different socioeconomic backgrounds, with their hands lifted-up, praising their God. As he beheld the beauty & unity of their praise and worship, he wondered – "Where is this church? This is something I want to be a

part of."

Hines says that God spoke to his heart. "Darrell, this is the church I have called you to Pastor." From that very moment, the vision never left his heart as he continued to travel around the country and abroad, preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ.

In the pursuing years, Logan became an integral part of that ministry. And according to many individuals whose lives he has impacted, many many souls have been saved.

Q: Do you consider your church progressive, traditional or cutting edge?

A: Bishop Logan said, "I can consider our church all of them as we work hard to be a church for all people".

Christian Faith Fellowship of Zion began with a service one Sunday morning in the Little Theatre, the fall of 1993 in Waukegan, IL. It was an outreach ministry of Hines' Milwaukee Church. Four years later after, CFFC Mission began, James and Deborah were ordained and installed as First Assistant Pastors and Willie & Cathy Moton as Second Assistant Pastors of Christian Faith Fellowship Church

Q: Tell us about your greatest challenge as a pastor?

A: Bishop Logan says that “My greatest challenge as a pastor is keeping Christ relevant to a diverse and changing world.”

From the initial days to now, Logan has made it relevant as evidenced by the growth of the church. According to church leaders, in 1997, James and Deborah Logan became the Senior Pastors of Christian Faith Fellowship Church of Waukegan and the membership swelled to over 400. Pastor Logan left his job at Abbott Labs and by years' end, God spoke to Pastor James about a building fund.

Out of his obedience to God, a building fund drive began in January of 1998. The next month, Pastors Logan began looking for a home for the congregation. Nothing seemed suitable with the rapid growth they were experiencing. Pastor Logan felt led of the Lord to have a real estate agent send letters to local churches, in the North Shore area, who might be thinking of relocating or just simply needed to sell. After a few weeks, a building became available in Zion, Illinois, which was paid off in 4 years.

Q: What are your future plans for the church?

A: The future plans for the church is preparing this generation and the next for the monumental changes occurring in our society.

God is tremendously equipping this ministry by providing 40 acres of land which has been paid off and building plans are in development to impact the spiritual, social and economic condition of this region for the glory of God! While in prayer God said, to Pastor James, “Go

to Zion and take the reproach off my name.” The rest will be written in glory as we pursue the call and plan that God has for our lives.

Q: Tell us about your pastimes such as your hobbies and things that you enjoy.


A: I enjoy reading and playing golf.

In 1964, President Lyndon Johnson's State of the Union address declared "unconditional war on poverty in America. This declaration was bold. Never before has a president declared war on a social ill. He intended not only to relieve the symptom of poverty but to cure and prevent it. Many social programs came from the War on Poverty- Head Start, Job Corps, VISTA and Community Action. Community Action Agencies address the root causes of poverty and equip low-income citizens with tools and opportunities to become self-sufficient.

In his state of the union speech, Johnson said, "Very often a lack of jobs and money is not the cause of poverty, but the symptom. The cause may lie deeper in our failure to give our fellow citizens a fair chance to develop their own capacities, in a lack of education and training, in a lack of medical care and housing, in a lack of decent communities in which to live and bring up their children."

The War has not been won, and the battles are getting tougher every day. Community Action Agencies have been on the front lines of the war on poverty, helping people and changing lives. Without these present efforts, more people would certainly be in poverty. In Illinois, one in six people live at or below the

poverty line. Too many of our citizens are living dangerously close to poverty.

This could be your neighbor, your grandparent or your child's classmate. For a family of four, the federal poverty line is an income of \$23,550 per year. This barely covers basic family needs. Many Americans are paycheck or major illness away from poverty. The disparity between the wealthiest and the poorest Americans is greater than it was in the 1960's and without intervention the gap will only get bigger.

So what do we do ? How do we address the paradox of poverty in the midst of plenty? Let's start talking about Poverty. We acknowledge its existence so that we can address it effectively. Community Action Partnership of Lake County remains here to tell the story for those that can't speak for themselves; we are here to fulfill the promise of Community Action.

Community Action changes people's lives, embodies the spirit of hope, improves communities and makes America a better place to live. We care about the entire community, and we are dedicated to helping people help themselves and each other.

A Little Help Please



My granddaughter was born three months premature weighing in at 1 pound, 13 ounces at birth. As she was making her entrance into the world, the doctors warned us that she would probably not be able to breathe on her own and that she probably would not cry after birth. However, God said differently. She was born breathing on her own and did not need to be connected to breathing apparatus. She also let out a hefty scream, to announce her arrival in the world.

Over the last year and a half, we have watched her grow into a very active toddler. Most recently, I had the fun of teaching her how to go up and down the stairs. Fun for me, trouble for mom and dad. One night as I was watching her, she decided to use her new skills to get off the bed. She tried different approaches, crawling to each side and the end of the bed to determine which provided the best angle.

Each time I tried to help her, she would scream and push my hand away as if she was saying, "Look, I got this!" So, I let her keep trying on her own. Finally getting the position right, feet first and not head first, she began her descent down the side of the bed. Midway down, she must have gotten a feeling of nothing beneath her feet. As I watched her clinging to the side of the bed with feet dangling in the air, she looked at me as if she was saying, "Ah, can you give me some help here!"

Later, as I watched her moving around, climbing on anything that did not move, I reflected back to the moment of her birth. I was reminded of the awesomeness of God and His goodness and mercy. I was also reminded of moments in my own life, moments of hanging on to the edge, needing emotional and spiritual help, but unwilling to ask for help.

Often times, we wrestle with hurt, anger, fear, and many other demonic forces (Ephesians 6:12), but refuse to seek or ask for help. Much like my granddaughter, I learned to cry out to the Lord for help. Thankfully, he has heard my cry, again and again. Being the loving Father He is, He has rescued me, evidencing the promise of His word (Jeremiah 1:12), "When they cry out to me I will hear, for I am compassionate" (Exodus 22:27) and his promise to never forsake or leave me (Hebrews 13:5).
